SUMMARY OF TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – THE SECOND SUNDAY AFTER CHRISTMAS

Jesus Is the Perfect Israel Israel (Jacob) and all his family went and dwelled in Egypt. (Genesis 46:1-7) God made a great nation of him there, but that nation would prove unfaithful to the Lord. Therefore, the New Israel came. In fleeing the murderous Herod, our young Lord goes to Egypt (Matthew 2:13-23), that the prophecy might be fulfilled: "Out of Egypt I called my Son." (Hosea 11:1) Jesus brings to perfection what old Israel could not. He is the faithful Israel, the embodiment of the people of God. He offers His perfect and holy life in place of our own. He submits Himself to persecution and suffering in order to save us. Therefore, we should not think it strange when we who are in Christ experience trials because of the faith. (1 Peter 4:12-19) Rather, we rejoice to share in Christ's sufferings, knowing that we will also share in His glory. (lcms.org/lectionary-summaries)

READING FROM THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS

Summary: Certainly our Father in heaven promises to deliver us, His baptized children of faith, from all evil and the evil one who seeks to devour us, just as He delivered His only begotten Son from Herod's evil plan. Therefore this petition, and every prayer of faith, simply calls upon Lord to deliver us from evil and the evil one according to His Word.

"But deliver us from evil," or from the evil one. The entire substance of our prayer is directed against our chief enemy. For he hinders among us everything that we pray for: God's Name or honor, God's Kingdom and will, our daily bread, a cheerful good conscience, etc.

We also pray to be delivered form whatever evil may happen to us under the devil's kingdom: poverty, shame, death, and all the agonizing misery and heartache. Since the devil is a liar and a murderer, he constantly seeks our life. He wreaks his vengeance whenever he can afflict us. He breaks men's necks or drives them to insanity, drowns some, and moves many to commit suicide and to many other terrible disasters. So we must pray against this archenemy without stopping. For unless God preserved us, we would not be safe from this enemy even for an hour.

So God has briefly placed before us all the distress that may ever come upon us, so that we might have no excuse whatever for not praying. But all depends upon this, that we learn also to say "*Amen*." This is nothing else than the word of undoubting faith, which does not pray on a dare but knows that God does not lie to us. For He has promised to grant it. *(lcmssermons.com; Large Catechism, 7th Petition of the L.P. Paragraphs 112-120)*

EPISTLE LESSON – 1 PETER 4:12-19

P: ^{4:12} Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. ¹³ But rejoice insofar as you share Christ's sufferings, that you may also rejoice and be glad when His glory is revealed. ¹⁴ If you are insulted for the Name of Christ, you are blessed, because the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon you. ¹⁵ But let none of you suffer as a murderer or a thief or an evildoer or as a meddler. ¹⁶ Yet if anyone suffers as a Christian, let him not be ashamed, but let him glorify God in that name. ¹⁷ For it is time for judgment to begin at the household of God; and if it begins with us, what will be the outcome for those who do not obey the gospel of God? ¹⁸ And "If the righteous is scarcely saved, what will become of the ungodly and the sinner?" ¹⁹ Therefore let those who suffer according to God's will entrust their souls to a faithful Creator while doing good.

¹⁹ But when Herod died, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, ²⁰ saying, "Rise, take the Child and His mother and go to the land of Israel, for those who sought the Child's life are dead." ²¹ And he rose and took the Child and His mother and went to the land of Israel. ²² But when he heard that Archelaus was reigning over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he withdrew to the district of Galilee. ²³ And he went and lived in a city called Nazareth, so that what was spoken by the prophets might be fulfilled, that He would be called a Nazarene.

SERMON: GOD THE HEAVENLY FATHER: HIS SONS' PROTECTOR AND PROVIDER – AND YOURS, MATTHEW 2:13-23

"This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, 'Out of Egypt I called My Son."" (Mt. 2:15) Amen.

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ, born on earth to save us. Amen. Just like you as well as every one who's ever lived or will yet live on earth, King Herod ought to "fear God" – that is, trust in and rely upon Him with all his heart, "and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man." (Eccl. 12:13) Yet Herod's hateful rejection of the true, eternal King of heaven and earth – born on earth to save him and all people – cuts the ruler off from God's salvation and dooms his soul forever. Herod mistakes the magi's Good News of the birth of the world's Savior for the birth of a political rival, and Herod will suffer no rivals. Yet as the hymn sings it, "When Christ's appearing was made known, King Herod trembled for his throne; But He Who offers heav'nly birth seeks not the kingdoms of this earth." (When Christ's Appearing Was Made Known: 1) And as our Lord Himself tells Pontius Pilate right before His crucifixion: "My Kingdom is not of this world...but...is from another place." (In. 18:36)

So let's travel with the little Lord Jesus, Joseph and His mother Mary from Bethlehem to Egypt to their hometown of Nazareth, seeing just how almighty God the Father, in His providential care, protects His beloved Son from all harm and danger – until He can't be protected any longer. For God's guidance and protection of the holy family during their earliest days together points to the great care which He provides you and your loved ones too. Let's look with tearful eyes upon the barbaric murders of the holy innocents in Bethlehem, understanding that we

who are joined with Jesus by faith must also expect affliction for our trust in Him to one degree or another. And let us take comfort in the knowledge that no matter what we've suffered or will yet suffer for being Christians.... No matter what personal or family griefs we must endure, our Lord assures us victory over the very worst of this life – all anguish and sorrow. Even more so, He promises us victory over the devil and all evil, sin, death and hell itself! And that no matter when or how we or our loved ones in the Lord die, *"His Kingdom ours remaineth." (TLH* 262:4)

Nothing good can be said about Herod the Great, as he was called. Sure, he increased the size and grandeur of the second temple of God and helped build up Jerusalem and other places in his kingdom. But at heart Herod was a psychopath – a monster who clung to power at all costs. Always insecure in his rule over the Roman province of Judea, Herod had his wife as well as three of his sons murdered – all because he feared that they might dethrone him. So it should come as no surprise to us that when he learns from the wise men that One has been born true King of the Jews (see Mt. 2:2), immediately Herod's heart is set on destroying the infant Jesus.

While it's most certainly true that Jesus is the Son of God, even so, He definitely wouldn't have survived Herod's murderous wrath had His heavenly Father not shielded Him from death as an infant. He's as defenseless and vulnerable as any young child would be when Herod orders Jesus' killing.

So God protects His young Son and preserves Jesus' life by-way-of Joseph's prompt departure from Bethlehem. It isn't yet our Lord's time to die for us and for all people on earth. The all-seeing Father knows the evil mind of Herod better than the tyrant himself does – that he's intent upon slaughtering His only Son. The baby Lord Jesus is unaware of the danger He's in and can do nothing about it. The all-powerful God of heavenly armies knows just how to guard and defend Him – just where to move His Son to safety. His Holy Child is powerless to defend Himself from trouble; to get Himself out of harm's way. God must intervene for Jesus' welfare – just as He does for yours.

God the Father's consummate care for His Son gives us great comfort because we know for certain that, since we're united to our Lord Jesus by faith alone, we receive the very same care and protection from heaven that our Savior first did. Psalm 121:7 declares: "The Lord will keep you from all evil; He will keep your life." Also, "He will command His angels to protect you wherever you go. They will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone," Psalm 91:11-12 assures you. "For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous." (1 Pet. 3:12) He "helps [us] and delivers [us]...from evil and saves [us] because [we] take refuge in Him." (Ps. 37:40) Just as baby Jesus' refuge was God His Father, so is He your "Refuge and Strength, a very present Help in trouble." (Ps. 46:1)

So we believe and confess – according to the Small Catechism – that God "defends [us] against all danger and guards and protects [us] from all evil." (Luther' Explanation of 1st Article of the Creed) Are we worthy of this? Not in the least as fallen, rebellious sinners against God. And yet God's own Son, Who was more-than-worthy of His Father's protection, renders us worthy of God's providential protection and care. How so? By being born a Child for us; by coming to serve us in great weakness; by bleeding, suffering and dying for us! The Christmas carol says it so beautifully and reassuringly: "Softly from His lowly manger Jesus calls one and all, You are safe from danger. Children, from the sins that grieve you you are freed; All you need I will surely give you." (All My Heart Again Rejoices: 5) In these words we see that our heavenly Father protects us and provides for us – now and always – through His precious Son.

The absolutely heart-wrenching tragedy of the slaughter of the innocents reminds us that, even amidst the joy and mirth of the Christmas season, we still live in a very fallen, very sinful and evil world. Christ came for this exact reason: To eternally save us out of this dead world, and to justly punish all wicked people forever – such as Herod – in terrible torment. Herod doesn't do any head-fakes or fire any warning shots, but sends his soldiers to slay all male two-year-olds and younger in Bethlehem. Jesus would've been one of them had He not fled, so that it can be said that the holy innocents were His very first martyrs, not in will, but in deed. We call the murdered innocents holy not because they died for Jesus but because He was born for them and would go on to die for them too.

St. Matthew "proclaimed in the infant blood spilled in Bethlehem a fulfillment of the words of Jeremiah 31. The prophet had foretold that Rachel would weep for her children, refusing consolation, because they were no more." Rachel here is a mother-figure who sees her children – the people of Judah – put to death for their wayward hearts or carted off to captivity in Babylon. Just as the people are all gone in Jeremiah's day, so are the holy innocents no more in Jesus' day. "In the face of such sad slaughter, and the rivers of blood mad men have spilled ever since" – like the recent mass-killing of innocent revelers in New Orleans – "[we] the Church find comfort in the words of [our] newborn King grown to manhood: 'The thief comes to steal,

kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly."" (Jn. 10:10) (Weedon: Celebrating the Saints, Holy Innocents, 241)

When we suffer for our faithfulness to the Lord Jesus, St. Peter says to us: "Do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you.... But rejoice insofar as you share Christ's sufferings, that you may also rejoice and be glad when His glory is revealed. If you are insulted for the Name of Christ, you are blessed, because the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon you. But let none of you suffer [for your misdeeds.] Yet if anyone suffers as a Christian, let him not be ashamed, but let him glorify God in that Name." (1 Pet. 4:12-16) The Apostle Peter would have us abstain from doing what's wrong in God's sight. That way, we're not at fault before Him, and don't have to fear anything from Him. Yet every time we wrong God and others, He has us see our sin as our death and destruction, so that we implore Him to wash away all our transgression in the precious blood of our Savior. Then Christ becomes the death and Destroyer of all our sins and trespasses, our death and damnation. And we, who suffer for the Name of Jesus – Who suffered for our salvation, we rejoice since we're counted worthy to suffer dishonor for our Redeemer. (See Acts 5:41)

Though Jesus faced the hellish wrath of a vile man determined to destroy Him at all costs; though Mary and Joseph endured the hardship of a hurried and long trip to Egypt, God brought the holy family all the way there and back home again, safe-and-sound. No matter what you and your loved ones will yet face in life – as with the ordeals, blows and griefs which you've already endured – *"the Lord will keep you from all evil. He will keep your life. The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time forth and forevermore."* (Ps. 121:7-8) Yes, *"The Lord will rescue [you] from every evil work and will bring [you] safely into His heavenly Kingdom. To Him be the glory forever and ever! Amen." (2 Tim. 4:18) The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.*
