SUMMARY OF TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Those Who Wait on the Lord Shall Rejoice The people of God are pilgrims and sojourners in this world, looking ahead to a destination yet to come. Though we are now God's children, the fullness of what we shall be has not yet been revealed. (1 John 3:1-3) So it is good for us to wait for the Lord. Jesus tells us that the wait is just for a little while: "A little while, and you will see Me no longer; and again a little while, and you will see Me." (John 16:16) Though you must experience sorrow for a time, though you must live as strangers in a world that is at enmity with Christ, yet your sorrow will be turned to joy when He returns. "But they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength" (Isaiah 40:31) The little while of weeping shall be replaced with an eternity of rejoicing in the presence of Christ the crucified and risen Savior. "And no one will take your joy from you." (John 16:22) (lcms.org/lectionary-summaries)

READING FROM THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS

Summary: Just as our Lord's dear disciples had sorrow for a little while when He died and was buried for the sins of the world, so too do we – as our Lord's dear baptized believers – have sorrow for a little while over our own sins before the comfort and joy of the Gospel of forgiveness is revealed.

By His Law God strikes down both obvious sinners and false saints. He declares no one to be in the right, but drives them all together to terror and despair. As Jeremiah says, "Is not My Word like a hammer that breaks the rock in pieces?" (23:29) This is true sorrow of heart, suffering, and the sensation of death. This is what true repentance means. Here a person needs to hear something like this, "You are all of no account, whether you are obvious sinners or saints in your own opinions. You have to become different from what you are now. You have to act differently than you are now acting." But to this office of the Law, the New Testament immediately adds the consoling promise of grace through the Gospel. This must be believed. As Christ declares, "Repent and believe in the Gospel." (Mark 1:15) That is, "become different, act differently, and believe My promise." The Law accuses all and convicts them of being sinners. This is so they can acknowledge before God that they are lost and can be prepared to receive grace and to expect and accept from the Lord the forgiveness of sins. This is what Christ Himself says, "Repentance and forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in My Name to all nations." (Luke 24:47) Through sin the Law kills. On the other hand, the Gospel brings consolation and forgiveness. (Smalcald Articles, Part 3, Repentance)

SERMON: EASTER JOY IN JESUS FOREVER AFTER TRIALS AND TRIBULATIONS – JOHN 16:16-22

"You now have sorrow; but I will see you again and your heart will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you." (Jn. 16:22) Amen.

Grace and peace to you in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. When a mother's time to give birth to her child has finally arrived, she's suddenly faced with a time of trial. The trial won't go on forever. When her son or daughter is born, relief and great joy quickly replace the agonizing pain of childbirth.

The pain of labor is different with different pregnancies. Some women give birth relatively easily. Others endure a longer, much more drawn out, painful birthing process. At times, serious complications or even death can follow for the mother.

There's no use for one mother to compare her situation with another and say, "She's so lucky! She's having a quick and easy labor!" Comparing and measuring who has it worse can only help make a person miserable.

When the mother is in the middle of labor, she can't just up-and-say, "I quit! Enough of this! I'm outta here!" Because the end will come. What may seem to take forever will come to its conclusion. And what a conclusion! A new life brought into the world, a beloved son or daughter, who's been hidden, finally revealed.

There is a way to "escape" the pregnancy – having to deliver the child, but it's so murderous, morally repugnant, evil as it ends the child's life and very often deeply scars the mother for life.

Our beloved Lord Jesus uses the delivery of a baby as an analogy for the suffering a Christian must endure.

We may suddenly have to endure a time of trial. Compared to a mother, we might have very little warning, whereas she typically gets nine months. The trial of a Christian won't go on forever. And when the trial's concluded, great joy replaces the pain.

The pain of one Christian's trials may be different than another Christian's trials. Some trials pass relatively easily. Others may go for months, even years. Sometimes, trials may be especially intense; may even lead to death.

There's no use for one Christian to compare his or her situation with another and say, "I wish I had it easier like he or she does!" Comparing and measuring who has worse trouble can only help make a person miserable. Besides, how can a person compare his or her afflictions with those of another person when it's hard to know what the other person's really going through?

When you're in the middle of a trial, you ordinarily can't get out of it. You must endure the trial for as long as God decides. God, in His wisdom and goodness, gives it to us. He'll remove it in His time. As we believe, so we sing: "Though a heavy cross I'm bearing and my heart feels the smart, shall I be despairing? God, my Helper, Who doth send it, well doth know all my woe and how best to end it." (TLH 532:2)

There's a way to get out of our trials as Christians. And that's to abandon our life in Christ. But this is a terrible, unthinkable way to go! If we, who carry Christ's very life in us in our Baptism, decide to forgo our life in Him, we may very well escape trials. If we reject our faith in Christ, our life may very well get easier. The problem is, we are then working to destroy the new life inside us. By rejecting the wonderful gift that God has given us, we could save ourselves discomfort and pain now. But later?

You and all who gratefully receive and grow in the gift of faith that God has given you in His Son will endure the difficulties that come with faith and life in Christ. So always keep the life of Christ in you, and keep the end in sight.

Because the end will come. What may seem like it's taking forever to end will come to its conclusion. And what a conclusion! A new life will be revealed to the world on the Last Day. The new person in us, which is the image of Jesus that has been nurtured in us by the Holy Spirit, will finally be revealed as we're raised to immortality and glory!

In the short term, we may simply get through the trial and find relief as our Lord releases us from our suffering. Suffering can't last forever. Since Christ died and rose for us, we know that all suffering ends sooner or later, and then finally forever!

We have a further example to apply to our suffering in the trial of the disciples. Jesus' words in our Gospel are specifically spoken to them, and we learn from their suffering. The little time of trial that the disciples suffer is like the little or not so little times of suffering that we must endure.

The disciples are suddenly faced by a time of trial. The trial won't go on forever, but at the time they don't know this. As far as they can tell, with Jesus' unjust arrest, trial and execution, all the good things that the Lord has come to give them and has promised them are as dead and gone as He is.

Their pain lasts a fairly short amount of time. Three days until relief may not seem long to us if we compare our longer periods of affliction to theirs. But the intensity of their anguish is much greater than ours. The way they see it, the Lord Who's brought hope to mankind has failed in His death and burial. They're grief-stricken. All hope is lost.

Our suffering may lead us to think that our Lord is displeased with us, is punishing us or has rejected us. We might imagine that God couldn't possibly love us if He's allowing such difficult and painful things to happen to us. The loneliness and hopelessness of thinking that God has turned His back to us is one of the worst things we can experience.

At such times, we must hold on to our faith in Christ and say to Him, "I know that You love me, dear Lord, because You shed Your precious blood in unimaginable suffering for me. Right now, it doesn't look or feel like You love me. But I will hold fast to You and trust You until You show me Your loving face again."

The disciples do their best to escape their trials. For a time, this seems to work. In fleeing from Jesus at His arrest; in hiding behind locked doors, they don't face the same suffering and death that their Lord does. But they suffer nonetheless because He's put to death, and all their hope – so they think – dies with Him.

There's one way they can get rid of suffering for the Lord. They can deny Jesus and never be associated with Him again. Peter tries this, but Jesus later has mercy on Him and restored Peter to His side. The disciples abandon Jesus, yet He later commissions them to make disciples of all nations. From then on, they won't deny Him or abandon Him again. They'll face great trials, scarcity and pain, imprisonment and exile, martyrdom and death. But they'll be faithful to their Lord all the way! They'll suffer all, even death, rather than fall away from Him.

Once Jesus' disciples have been forgiven and restored by their Lord, why would they try to kill off the new life which He's put inside them? They might escape discomfort and pain in this life by leaving Jesus forever, but in the end they'll lose everything forever, as Judas Iscariot sadly loses it.

Instead, by God's grace they face suffering for the sake of their loving Lord and for the sake of the crown of eternal life which He's earned for them; which He promises them. They gratefully receive and grow in the gift of life which their Savior has given them. They endure the difficulty of trials and keep the end in sight.

Because the end will indeed come for them. They're faithful to the end. On the Last Day, their lives, like ours, will reach an amazing conclusion, which is also a beginning. The new life of the resurrection will be fully realized as we all receive new bodies – as perfect and unspoiled as an infant's body, yet fully mature and full of glory like our dear Lord's resurrected body. Our lives will emerge from this present life of preparation to the true life, the life that was our destiny all along. From this infancy, we will move to adulthood. Our lives will be new and full and complete as they never could be here. All trials will be left behind. All pain will be extinct. And our risen bodies, glorious like the sun and the stars, will be revealed in the perfect, endless new heaven-and-earth that our Lord has prepared for us. Amen. *The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.*
