What if, while out metal detecting or digging for gold, you unearthed an artifact — something of real historical and cultural importance? Would you know what to do? Each state has rules that govern artifact recovery, and so does the federal government. Keep in mind that even if you are not on



state or federal land, there are laws that regulate the collecting of relics on private property, too.

The Federal Bureau of Land Management defines an artifact as "...objects made or used by humans... examples are pottery, baskets, bottles, weapons, arrowheads, rock paintings and carvings. Artifacts also include graves and skeletal materials that are at least 100 years old."

The really big federal law to pay attention to is the Archaeological Resources Protection Act of 1979 (ARPA). This law will be enforced no matter what federal or Indian lands you happen to be on. ARPA covers "archaeological resources" and not mineralogical resources such as gold, silver and other precious and semi-precious minerals. What exactly is an "archaeological resource" you wonder? # Mining Claim Holder Rights

A mining claim gives the claim holder the right to the locatable minerals and metals on that claim. The general public is not allowed to explore for or collect valuable locatable minerals or metals on a valid mining claim, even federally owned. But, owning a claim does not give the owners the right to bar the public from free access to the area—unless you can prove the need to prevent public access because of a hazardous condition. A hazard might include the use of heavy pond. Under these want anyone wandering your claim due to safety

### Rock Crushers Help Get Gold



Rocks are rocks, unless they contain valuable minerals, metals, or elements. When a rock has values in it, it's then called ore. In order to liberate the minerals, it needs to be crushed down. In days of yore, a stamp mill was the primary form of crushing rock, but nowadays you can choose from small hand held samplers to big impact mills. They all have their own pros and cons --



Arizona's Superstition Mountains have been a source of mystery and legend since ancient times, beginning with the Native Americans who left behind cliff dwellings and unusual petroglyphs. In the 1840s, the Peralta family from Mexico supposedly developed a rich gold mine, but during one of their trips back to Mexico with a lot of gold, all but a couple of family members were killed by Apaches. Over the years, a number of prospectors were rumored to have found the Peralta Mine, but one disaster or other seemed to occur before a good map was made, or before a claim was filed. In the 1870s, Jacob Waltz "the Dutchman" (actually from Germany) was said to have located this "lost mine" and hid caches of gold in the Superstitions, especially near Weaver's Needle, which is a well known rock formation. Before his death in 1891, Waltz allegedly described the mine's location to a neighbor who had cared for him during his illness. But neither the neighbor nor dozens of others were able to locate the Lost Dutchman Gold Mine. Subsequent gold seekers have met with foul play or even death, contributing to the legends surrounding the Superstition Mountains. If you're a treasure hunter and like a challenge, supposedly the lost mine and plenty of gold is still waiting to be discovered in a hidden canyon. But even if you never find the mine, you can still get great views of the mountains from 320acre Lost Dutchman State Park in Apache Junction (shown in photo).
