- Have members huddle into groups of two or three and share some questions that have been troubling them personally. Allow 3-5 minutes for members to share in their groups.
- Then ask members to pray with you. Lead them in a prayer something like the following one which is built around the four major sections of the focal passage (see the "Lesson outline" activity above).
- Heavenly Father, we acknowledge that you are the one and only God and that you have all knowledge and all power. We just want to be silent for a moment in your presence, Lord. (Pause for 30 seconds of silence.)

Because of your awesomeness, we confess that we are sometimes confused how certain situations could exist in our lives and in the lives of others. We have just been sharing with one another


some of the troubling questions that we have. And, right now, we want to ask you those questions, each of us asking you silently the questions that are troubling us most. (Pause for about 30 seconds while members pray silently.)

And now, having asked you those questions, we want to wait for your response. You may not answer us immediately. You may not answer us today. But we will wait, expecting to hear from you. (Pause for 30 seconds.)

Finally, Father, we want to rejoice in you and in the hope that we have because of you. Although things may not be going as we want them to, we find joy and strength in our relationship with you. We love you, Lord. Amen.

Wrapping It Up

• Even when all else fails, believers can have hope in the presence and sufficiency of God. In fact, sometimes it takes the failure of everything we try to do to remind us to put our hope in God alone.

Silent brainstorming

- In advance, write one of the following headings at the top of three different sheets of paper:
- O Crises we may face in the future
- Ways we prepare for the future
- Reasons our plans for the future may go wrong
- Hand each sheet to a different person. Ask them to list one item related to the heading, then pass the sheet to the person beside them. Continue until all have had input on each sheet.
- Ask the persons who end up with the sheets to read aloud the heading and the items listed.

- Draw a large circle on the chalkboard. Divide it into quarters. Starting with the upper left quarter and moving clockwise, write one of the following words (and accompanying B Scripture reference) in each section of the circle:

- REJOICE (3:17-19)
- Use the outline to guide the study of the focal passage. Suggest that the four sections tell us actions to take when unexpected crises come in our lives.

- Pass out copies of the following choral reading (duplicate Item 1). Appoint persons to read the parts of 1. 2. and 3.
- Divide the class into two groups, designated A and B. (You can divide by gender, initial of last name, or birth month.) Point out the lines to be read by each group.
- Call attention also to the lines to be read by ALL of the class.
- Ask the person designated as 1 to begin the reading.

Habakkuk . . . (tell what he did as described in this passage). In the same way, we . . . (tell what we should do as related to this part of the outline)."

• Allow groups 5 minutes to study and write. Then have each group read aloud (1) the verses assigned to them, and (2) the paragraph they wrote.

- Use the following questions to guide a group discussion:
- O What are some "idols" or manmade things that we sometimes allow to take God's place in our lives? • How can we use memories of past events to refocus our lives on God? • What are some times when you have had to wait patiently for God's Asking God answer? How did you handle those times?
- O Is it easier to praise God when everything is going our way or when we are facing problems, troubles, and crises? Why?
