. SKIT

SAM What's our study for today?

LOU We're going to look at the last nine chapters of the Book of Ezekiel.

SAM What are they about?

LOU They tell about a vision that God gave to the prophet Ezekiel.

SAM What did he see in the vision?

LOU The land of Israel, Jerusalem, the temple.

SAM I guess everything was in ruins, since Israel was in exile.

LOU No, the vision was not of the present, but of some time in the future. Ezekiel saw a magnificent land, a beautiful city, a glorious temple, and a blessed community.

SAM How far in the future did the vision take Ezekiel?

LOU We're not sure. Some think Ezekiel saw how God intended for Jerusalem and its temple to be rebuilt when the exiles returned home.

SAM Is that what happened? LOU Not exactly. The temple described in Ezekiel's vision has never been built. Some think it will be built after Jesus returns, during His millennial reign.

SAM Are there other ideas?

LOU Some see the vision as symbolic of the church age or heaven, but the descriptions and measurements seem more literal than figurative. The passage reads like other Bible texts that describe the construction of the tabernacle, Solomon's Temple, or Noah's

ark.

SAM What else is in this section?

LOU The vision describes worship in the temple, with particular attention to the altar, the priests, sacrifices, offerings, holy days and feasts. Also the division of the land among the tribes of Israel.

SAM Did you say sacrifices?

LOU Yes, animal sacrifices.

SAM That doesn't seem to fit in with a temple during the millennial reign of Christ.

LOU Some believe that during that time the Jewish people will offer animal sacrifices looking back on Christ's sacrificial death, just as in Old Testament times the sacrifices looked forward to His death.

SAM This is all pretty confusing to me. LOU That's not unusual. These chapters have puzzled a lot of people through the years, just trying to understand what the vision is about and what it means. At one time, according to the Holman Bible Dictionary, people under age 30 were not allowed to read Ezekiel 40—48.

SAM You're kidding!

LOU No, that's what they say.

SAM Well, then, get out of my way. I'm ready to dig in and see what God has to say to me through the last nine chapters of Ezekiel.

LOU Let's do it.



Getting a taste

- Help the class get an overview of the content of these chapters by having them look at a few representative verses from each section. Have someone read aloud the following verses. After the verses are read, share the commentary given here in bold face.
- 40:1-4. It had been 14 years since the fall of Jerusalem, and 25 years since the exile began. Through visions, God transported the prophet Ezekiel to Israel. He was encouraged to pay close attention to everything he saw and heard.
- 40:5. Ezekiel's tour guide was a man "whose appearance was bronze." The man constantly measured walls, doors, rooms, and windows as he led the prophet through the entire temple area, from the outer courtyard to the inner sanctuary. ○ 43:4-5. The man took Ezekiel
- o 43:4-5. The man took Ezekiel outside so he could see the glory of the Lord approach and then fill the temple.
- 44:15. Specific instructions were given for how the priests were to carry out the sacrifices of worship in the temple.

- o 47:1-5. With no other source but the temple itself, the flow of water continues to increase and deepen until it is a river that no one can cross.
- 48:30-35. The land is divided among the tribes of Israel, and the city is renamed, "The Lord is there," which, in Hebrew is "Yahweh-Shammah," which sounds something like the Hebrew for Jerusalem, "Yerushalayim."

Focusing on one section

• Have learners focus on Ezekiel 43:1-12, which tells of the glory of God entering and filling the temple. Ask someone to read the passage aloud.

• Give each person a pencil and a copy of the following study guide, but without the answers provided here in parentheses (duplicate Item 1). Have them choose someone to work with as they study the passage and complete the study guide.

- O Think about the difference that God's glory made to that temple. What was it like before God's glory entered it? What was it like afterwards?
- How important is the presence of God to worship? Do we need Him when we worship? Why or why not?
- When we gather as a congregation for a worship service, isGod there? How can we know?
- What difference does the presence of God make in our worship?
- What would keep God from attending a worship service?What would keep Him away?
- What would draw God to a worship service? What would make Him feel welcome? What would cause Him to want to be there?
- What can you, as an individual, do to invite God's presence into your worship regardless of what anyone else in the congregation does?

Wrapping It Up

• Just going through the motions of worship is a waste of time and energy. If we will genuinely worship God in spirit and in truth, He will receive our worship, He will fill our temple with His glory, filling us with His Holy Spirit. That is worth the time and energy that sincere worship requires. Have someone lead the class in prayer.
