For now, let's just say that Melchizedek was a unique priest, one of a kind. Jesus is our one of a kind great high priest.

#### Group discussion

- Use these questions to guide the class in a discussion of role models:
- What is a role model? (someone after whom we pattern our lives)
  What types of people do children often choose as role models?
  (athletes, actors, teachers, parents, fictional characters)
- Who was your role model as a child, and why? How did having that role model affect your childhood and later years?
- What advantages are there in having a role model? (gives direction, goal)
- What disadvantages are there in having a role model? (role model will have flaws, may disappoint

Faith at Home
Ask family members to tell what it means to them that Jesus is our Great High Priest.

- you, may cause you to do things that are not best)
- o If we had to choose one role model for life, who would be the best choice? (members may suggest various role models including some biblical figures; several will probably suggest Jesus Christ as the best role model)
- The author of Hebrews presents Jesus as the perfect role model. He has set the example for us in his faithfulness, submission, obedience, and suffering.

#### Making It Personal

#### Finishing a sentence

• Give each person a pencil and a copy of the following uncompleted statement (duplicate Item 2):

Because Jesus is my great high priest, I will:

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• Ask learners to complete the sentence silently, listing three things they will do in response to today's study. Allow a minute or so, then let volunteers share one thing they will do.

#### **Wrapping It Up**

• Jesus is not just a priest, not just a high priest, but our great high priest, who went through the heavens into the presence of the Father where He intercedes on our behalf today. We can be forgiven because He not only died on the cross but arose from the dead and is alive.

#### Getting Started

#### Defining a word

• What is a priest? Let members respond. After several have had input, write this suggested definition on the chalkboard:

priest: liaison between God and people

- What are some religions that might have a priest? (Judaism, Catholicism, Hinduism, Buddhism, pagan religions)
- When you think about a religious priest, how do you think someone in that role might serve as a representative of people to God? Wait for responses, which may include offering sacrifices for the people, taking the people to God in prayer, asking God's blessing upon people.
- How would someone in that role serve as a representative of God to the people? Teach them the Word of God, tell them what God's will is, offer them God's forgiveness or blessing.

- Although Baptists have ministers, pastors, deacons and other spiritual leaders, we do not have the role of "priest." Why is that? Explain that Baptists hold to the Christian belief that each person has direct access to God through Jesus Christ. Therefore we do not need a human priest to be a mediator between us and the Father.
- Write on the chalkboard:

#### priesthood of the believer

- This Bible-based doctrine is called "priesthood of the believer." We have direct access to God because Christ has broken down the barriers through His death on the cross. Have someone read aloud Ephesians 2:14-16. We have become a holy priesthood, where each of us is a priest, standing in the presence of God because of Jesus Christ. Have someone read aloud 1 Peter 2:5. Jesus Christ is the only mediator we need between ourselves and the Father. Have someone read aloud 1 Timothy 2:5.
- This is a major theme of the Book of Hebrews and we are going to begin learning more about that in today's study.
- Call on one of the "priests" in your class to lead in prayer.

- Have someone read aloud Hebrews 4:14.
- By calling Jesus "a great high priest," the writer is declaring that Jesus is the epitome of high priests, the best of them all, superior to every other high priest. What are some of the ways that Jesus and human high priests are different? As members respond, have someone jot down their input in the chart you drew on the chalkboard. Be sure they point out:

- Psalm 110:4 refers to an Old Testament priest named Melchizedek. To paraphrase an expression, he was a priest before priests were cool. Let's read the passage that tells of the only event recorded from his life. Have someone read aloud Genesis
