When Kids Don't Want to Go to Church

Several times a year I teach a Child Dedication class, and one of my favorite parts of the class is embracing the tension between letting kids making their own choice and making some choices for them. In the class, we cover Deuteronomy 6:4 and this tension lives in the part of the passage, "Impress them on your children." What this verse unpacks for parents isn't quite applicable for the parents of babies in the dedication class, but it's a huge principle that parents need to carry with them as their kids grow.

In over 15 years of ministry I've seen some patterns emerge. There are almost always more 4-year-olds than 9-year-olds at your church. There are almost always more 9-year-olds than 13-year-olds and lastly, there are almost always more 13-year-olds than 18-year-olds. Why?

There are probably lots of answers to that question, but what I've found is, very simply, kids just don't want to go to church, and parents don't want to make them. I think that most parents mean well. They don't want to force faith on their kids in fear that their kids will reject it.

So what are parents to do when they face this situation?

Several months ago, Ruth Meyer from the blog TruthNotes.net wrote a great post called "Why I Would Never Force My Kids to Go to Church." She uses the very same examples I've been using in my Child Dedication classes for years. Kids don't always understand what is best for them, and they don't have the wisdom (life experiences) to make certain decisions until they're older. For example:

- If my child doesn't want to brush his teeth because he doesn't like it... it doesn't matter. I know better than he does. He's going to brush his teeth.
- If my child doesn't like school... it doesn't matter. I know better than she does, and it's the law. She's going to go to school.
- If my child doesn't like vegetables... it doesn't matter. I know that they are healthy and that there will be a day that his/her taste will change. We'll keep trying them.

These things don't make me a bad parent. They make me a good parent.

Church is no different. Kids will wake up and say they don't want to go to church. They may be like this for months or maybe even years. It's normal. Parents need to be encouraged to parent well through these phases. They know better, and this is a time when they need to do what they know is best for their child.

Exception — I think there is space for an exception. If you're forcing a child to attend a church that makes Jesus boring... then I'd maybe reconsider your church or see how you can help be the change to make ministry to kids and students relevant, exciting and relational.

Here's a final thought from Ruth's post:

Church isn't a place you go to get pumped up about life. It isn't entertainment like a movie or concert. It is literally a life and death matter. Eternal life. Just as a loving parent wouldn't allow their child to wander in the road or to quit school, a loving Christian parent also does not give the option to their children about going to church, learning Bible stories at home, and praying together. Do your kids always jump for joy when they hear you say, "Time to get up! Let's get ready for church!" No. They won't. Do they get excited for school every morning? Hardly. But you still make them go. Why? Because you are the parent and you know what's best. Even when they complain, you serve them healthful meals and limit their junk food intake. You set boundaries for their own safety when playing outside. You insist they go to school because you're looking at the long term picture. And you are right to do those things. How much more so are you responsible for doing all you can to secure their eternal well being?

Communicate this to your parents. Encourage them. Cast this vision when they have babies, when their babies become preschoolers, when the preschoolers become elementary age, when the elementary-aged kids become pre-teens and when the pre-teens become teenagers. Stick with it because this is the only chance they get!


World Communion Sunday

Music Ministry Matters

The two books of Chronicles in the Old Testament have some wonderful stories of powerful worship services. One such story is found in II Chronicles 5, which tells the story of the Ark of the Covenant being brought into the temple built during the reign of Solomon for the first time. At the end of this chapter are the following verses:

It came even to pass, as the trumpeters and singers were as one, to make one sound to be heard in praising and thanking the Lord; and when they lifted up their voice with the trumpets and cymbals and instruments of musick, and praised the Lord, saying, For he is good; for his mercy endureth for ever: that then the house was filled with a cloud, even the house of the Lord; so that the priests could not stand to minister by reason of the cloud: for the glory of the Lord had filled the house of God.

I just love this story. The ark has been set to rest in the Holy of Holies, the priests exit this sacred place and the Levites who served in song begin to make music. This must have been a grand song of praise, though the words they sang could easily be updated to the song we sang last week, "God is good…all the time!" And what happens next? The glory of the Lord so fills the house that the priests cannot even stand up to minister. I know Allen well enough to say that, if the music we made on any given Sunday ushered in the glory of God to the point that he couldn't even preach, he'd be just fine with that.

When God's people worship Him "in spirit and in truth" (in other words, from the deepest recesses of our souls being honest with Him), the Holy Spirit can do "exceeding abundantly above all we ask or think". If we lay our hearts bare before God as we worship and give everything we have as we praise Him in one voice, God will move mightily among us.

Church's Domestic Violence Response Predates NFL News

What does the face of domestic violence look like?

It could belong to the person sitting next to you in church each Sunday, says Ginger Grissom.

She knows from experience. For eight years, as executive director of the United Methodist-supported Wesley House Community Center in Meridian, Miss., she has helped abuse survivors rebuild their lives. She is also a survivor, she says.

United Methodists, like Grissom, have been confronting family violence long before the NFL's response to players' assault charges was making headlines.

United Methodists for decades have helped support shelters for women and children. They also have worked with policymakers and law enforcement to treat domestic violence not simply as a private matter but as a crime.

In the past five years, United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men have collaborated to provide training and advocacy on the issue. Other United Methodist agencies, including the Commission on the Status and Role of Women and the Board of Church and Society, also are involved in advocacy.

Still, Grissom and other advocates — including UMW and UMM executives — say church leaders can do more to address a problem seldom mentioned from the pulpit.

A May survey by LifeWay Research, which included United Methodists, found about four in 10-42 percent — of Protestant senior pastors "rarely" or "never" speak about domestic violence. Nearly three in 10-29 percent — said they believe domestic violence is not a problem in their church.

Those pastors are wrong, Grissom pointed out.

"The church needs to be open (to the fact) that domestic violence happens," she said. "It's happening to people in every church in the United States. The only way that we can fight it is to know that ... and to be open to bringing in professionals who deal with it every day."

DAUNTING STATISTICS

The numbers bear her out. About three in 10 women and one in 10 men have experienced violence or stalking by a partner, according to the National Domestic Violence Hotline.

Domestic violence crosses all racial, cultural and socioeconomic lines. Perpetrators can include plumbers, business professionals and even clergy.

The people affected include not just abuse victims themselves but also their loved ones, especially their children.

Mississippi Area Bishop James E. Swanson Sr., like Grissom, has personal experience with the costs of domestic violence. When he was 18 in 1968, his mother was killed by his stepfather because she refused to give him money for alcohol.

His loss has shaped his ministry and has given him better understanding of why people stay in abusive relationships, he said.

"A lot of times, they are trying to be a savior of that man that they love," he said.

"Pastors have to know that when they first offer assistance, they are probably going to be turned down. But if you remain a non-anxious presence, sooner or later that person will turn to you and you can offer resources to her."

No matter the victim's educational or financial background, leaving an abusive relationship is tough.

"Why do people stay? Most of the time it's because of fear," Grissom said. "And absolutely that fear is substantiated by statistics. The most dangerous time for any victim of domestic violence is when she chooses to leave. People die."

Grissom said it took her 15 years to leave. Her story is similar to many other abuse survivors' firsthand accounts. She found herself isolated from family, banned from eating fattening food and under financial and spiritual control.

"The fact is that I am survivor, but I am a survivor by the grace of God," she said.


