### **1. MEETING OPENING**

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Ronald L. Brand, Town of Farmington Director of Development and Planning. After the Pledge of Allegiance was recited, the Committee members and Advisors were introduced.

## 2. CHARGE TO THE COMMITTEE

See Town Board Resolution #450 of 2019, approved November 12, 2019 (Appendix 1).

## 3. OVERVIEW OF THE UPDATE PROCESS; NEW YORK STATE TOWN LAW REQUIREMENTS; STATE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY REVIEW (SEQR) REGULATIONS

Mr. Brand provided the following information:

- Under New York State Law, the Town Board members have two options: to update the Comprehensive Plan themselves or to appoint a committee and provide the committee with a specific charge.
- The most recent Farmington Comprehensive Plan was adopted on December 22, 2003, and amended on July 26, 2011.
- The Update Committee will review environmental resources, utilities, infrastructure, highways and land use patterns that have developed in the Town since 2011.
- The Comprehensive Plan process began in 1965 with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Planning Program and New York State providing funding for municipalities for this purpose (87 percent Federal funds, 6.5 percent State funds, 6.5 percent local funds).
- The Town of Farmington General Plan was submitted to the Town Board on August 31, 1967, by the firm of Candebub, Fleissig and Associates, Niagara Falls, N.Y. This plan focused on the Hamlet of Pumpkin Hook that was envisioned for development growth and on the general center of the Town (State Route 96/State Route 332). The Plan led to the establishment of land-use methods and zoning.
- When considering grant applications, State agencies first look for a municipality's updated Comprehensive Plan. The State suggests that a Comprehensive Plan be reviewed every five years. Mr. Brand said that he prefers to have the Town Board receive an annual report from the Planning Board on the maintenance of the Town's Comprehensive Plan.

Mr. Brand: Said that the Town Board is required by State law to conduct a Public Hearing on the update to the Comprehensive Plan following submittal of the Plan by the Committee. He said that he would like the update to be your [the Committee's] Plan with consensus on points that may have to be achieved during discussion. He said that this has been the process used by committees in the past.

Mr. Brand: Reviewed the High Priority Action Items in the 2011 Plan that have been accomplished:

- Adoption of the 2011 amendment to the Comprehensive Plan
- Construction of Mertensia Park
- Preparation of a Sewer and Water Master Plan
- Capital improvements to the Town's sewage treatment plant
- Amendment of the Major Thoroughfare Overlay District (MTOD) Official Map
- Amendments to the Town Code and the Town Zoning Map
- Creation of architectural and landscaping guidelines for Route 96 and Route 332
- Adoption of the Town of Farmington Parks and Recreation Master Plan
- Adoption of the Town of Farmington Farmland Protection Plan
- Updating the Open Space Inventory (on a parcel-by-parcel basis)
- Receipt of a \$1.9 million Federal highway grant for the Auburn Trail

Hal Adams: Said that the Genesee Land Trust is working with a Farmington family to submit a Purchase of Development Rights (PDR) grant application to the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets in the 2020 grant application cycle for the preservation of the family's farmland in the southeastern portion of the Town.

Mr. Brand: Discussed the changes that have occurred in the Town since 2011 including the increase in residential growth, utility improvements and additional highway travel lanes.

Mr. Brand: Said that the rating capacity of the wastewater treatment plant has doubled to 4 million gallons per day from 2011 and that the flow into the plant is approximately 1.6 million to 1.8 million gallons per day, plus peak periods. Sewer line connections have been increased in response to developments such as Hickory Rise, Redfield Grove and Auburn Meadows subdivisions, among others. A new section of the sewer transmission line has been installed along the west side of State Route 332 and under County Road 41 to serve the Hathaway's Corners project that is now in progress.

Mr. Brand: Said that a stormwater facility map will be added to the update of the Comprehensive Plan to reflect the requirements of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4). He said that there are currently 43 stormwater facilities in the Town and that this number continues to rise with each new project.

Mr. Delpriore: Said that the most common stormwater facility is a pond but that any green infrastructure device (dry swales, outfall, culverts, etc.) is considered a stormwater facility, i.e., any device that tracks where stormwater is coming from, and where it is going. He said that the State's new MS4 Permit regulations will require a greater frequency of stormwater facility inspections within the next five years.

Mr. Giroux: Said that what appears to be a ditch along Canandaigua-Farmington Town Line Road is actually a bioswale with underground pipes for control of the flow of stormwater.

Mr. Brand: Discussed several Incentive Zoning projects that have been approved by the Town Board in recent years including the Hickory Rise, Monarch Manor and Redfield Grove subdivisions; Hathaway's Corners; and MIII Enterprises (that included property transfers from among four landowners to create the Ivory Drive/Carmen's Way ingress and egress from the Auburn Meadows subdivision to the signalized intersection at the corner of State Route 332 and Carmen's Way).

Mr. Brand: said that the taxpayers have received amenities of more than \$1 million from the developers who have sought Incentive Zoning approvals. He said that the improvement of the State Route 332/County Road 41 intersection in 2020 will also be an Incentive Zoning amenity provided by the developer of Hathaway's Corners.

Mr. Brand: Discussed the Farmington Pointe Incentive Zoning project (1600 Rochester Road). Mr. Delpriore displayed the concept site plan of this project.

Mr. Brand: Said that the Town has been working with the New York State Department of Transportation (DOT) to have the DOT acknowledge the traffic changes on State Route 332 that have occurred, and that will occur, from the recent and future developments. He said that the DOT does not wish to reduce the speed limit on State Route 332 to maintain the efficiency of the highway and to limit the number of signalized intersections. Mr. Brand said that the Town has worked with the DOT in the preparation of a highway map that identifies the spacing of future signalized intersections. He said that developers are finding that this type of joint agreement between the DOT and the Town is reducing the State approval time of developers' applications.

Mr. Brand: Discussed plans for the Farmington Market Center (Tops Supermarket plaza) on State Route 96. Among the proposals are a Tops fueling station, a Mavis Tire Store on the southwest corner of State Route 96 and Mertensia Road, a freestanding bank branch of Canandaigua National Bank, and outparcels that may include restaurants and other commercial businesses. A new Town road is also under consideration that would run from State Route 96 to Mercier Boulevard along the western portion of the property.

Mr. Brand: Said that LeFrois Construction Company owns the parcel of land to the east of Farmington Market Center and has proposed a mix of commercial and residential (apartments), and the use of the proposed new Town road that would run between the two properties. He said that upgrades to the sewer system and the funding of a new sewer connection are among the amenities being considered to be provided to the Town by this developer.

Bryan Adams: Asked about holding off on the approvals of new projects until the update to the Comprehensive Plan has been completed. Mr. Brand said that some municipalities have considered a moratorium if there are a number of pressing needs. He said that Farmington has anticipated a number of needs—such as improvements to water and sewer utilities. He said that we [the Town] know what we need and must convince developers to do it.

Mr. Brand: Said that another Incentive Zoning project is expected to be proposed for a parcel of land on the west side of State Route 332 north of the McDonald's Restaurant and south of West Corporate Drive.

Mr. Brand: Said that a former Planned Development site on the north side of State Route 96 (across from Finger Lakes Gaming and Racetrack) was rezoned several years ago. He said that the Simmons Rockwell automobile dealer is considering a dealership on a parcel of land in this vicinity.

Mr. Brand: Said that the Glacier Lakes indoor water park and hotel that was proposed on three large parcels of land on the southeast corner of State Route 332 and County Road 41 (just north of the New York State Police facility) did not materialize. He said that the Town will be interested to hear how the property owner plans future development on these parcels.

Mr. Brand: Said that the Town has been growing at a stable rate. He said that some would say that the Town has been growing too fast. Mr. Brand said that figures from the Building Department show that since July 2011 approximately 510 single-family homes (the majority of which are located in the southwest quadrant of the Town), that 337 town-house units and that 168 apartments have been built. He discussed an example of the sale of a large portion of agricultural land that was used for one single-family home and the need for regulations to avoid this type of loss of farmland.

Mr. Brand: Provided the following census information:

2000 census: Population 10,584

2010 census: Population 11,825

2017 census: Population 12,891

Mr. Brand: Said that he has completed a draft of Chapter 1 of the Comprehensive Plan. This will be sent via e-mail to the Committee by the clerk following the meeting later this evening. He asked everyone to feel free to edit the draft as needed.

Mr. Brand: Discussed planned improvements to restrooms and other features in several of the Town parks. Mr. Giroux said that playground equipment and swing sets will be upgraded in Town Park, and that restrooms will be improved to ADA compliance in Town Park and Pumpkin Hook Park. He said that construction will begin soon following the arrival of materials. Supervisor Ingalsbe said that a State Senator Pamela Helming arranged a grant of \$75,000 that will be augmented with Town funds for the park restrooms project.

Mr. Giroux: Said that planning for the development of Beaver Creek Park will begin following the update of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

Mr. Brand: Said that the draft Comprehensive Plan to completed by the Committee must be referred to the Ontario County Planning Board for review. He also said that the Plan must comply with the State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) regulations.

Supervisor Ingalsbe: Discussed the scope of the Town's water and sewer utilities. He said that the Town purchases water from the City of Canandaigua, that the Town water district extends from North Road in the Town of Canandaigua to the Wayne County line, and that several water lines extend into the Town of Hopewell. Supervisor Ingalsbe said that the Canandaigua–Farmington Sewer District extends from Purdy Road in the Town of Canandaigua north to the sewer plant on McMahan Road in the Town of Victor. The sewer district includes Eastview Mall, the Hamlet of Fishers and the industrial areas along State Route 96. He said that the district maintains approximately 35 pump stations and that the Town of Victor is current installing a new sewer transmission line to the plant.

Ms. Hilton: Said that Maps 1–15 were part of the 2011 Plan and that Maps 16–18 have been added. Mr. Brand requested that Committee members and Advisors review the maps and send any questions or concerns to him.

Mr. Brand: Reviewed the chapters and sections of the Plan to be updated:

- Chapter 1: Executive Summary
- Chapter 2: Background, Assets and Constraints
- Chapter 3: Goals, Objectives and Recommended Actions
- Chapter 4: Future Land Use Plan Map and Plan Synthesis
- Chapter 5: Sustaining and Implementing the Plan’s Actions

Glossary

State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR): Full Environmental Assessment Form Part 2 and Part 3

Evaluation of the Importance of Impacts

## **5. DISCUSSION**

Bryan Adams: Suggested that the text files be uploaded to Google Docs for editing purposes. He said that this program would be required to be loaded onto the Committee members’ and Advisors’ computers to access the files. He said that he will work with the clerk of the Committee to arrange this.

Mr. Plante: Asked about the Genesee Transportation Council (GTC) State Route 332/ State Route 96 Corridor Study and its impact upon the update to the Comprehensive Plan. Mr. Brand said that the GTC has received funding for this study but that he does not ex-

pect the study to be completed prior to the required date of completion of the Comprehensive Plan. He said that it is important for the Town to have the Comprehensive Plan updated to provide a competitive advantage for a sidewalk grant application in early 2020. Mr. Brand said that the Town seeks to move in a deliberate manner and does not wish to lose an opportunity for sidewalk grant funding. He said that the Plan could be amended following the completion of the GTC corridor study.

Ms. Charland: Asked if community attitudes toward development have changed since the 2011 Plan update. She said that she did not think that she has her thumb on the pulse of the community. Mr. Brand said that the public needs to have the assurance that what we [the Committee] is doing is well intended, deliberate and well thought out. He said that the Town has quite well anticipated the needs and that the Town is thinking ahead of the curve with sewer and water utility improvements, and the grant funding for the replacement of the Brickyard Road water tank and the associated new water transmission line into Farmington to meet the needs of development and growth. He discussed the improvements on Canandaigua–Farmington Town Line Road and the installation of sidewalks throughout the Town. Mr. Brand said that people are using the sidewalks and that the Town hears from developers that the sidewalks are big selling points. He said that the opening of the Auburn Trail is a major milestone and that although some people will say that traffic is too fast, the Ivory Drive connection to Carmen’s Way and the signalized intersection at State Route 332 and Ivory Drive has taken a great deal of vehicle pressure off New Michigan Road.

Mr. Brand: Said that the developer of the proposed Farmington Pointe project (1600 Rochester Road) is willing to donate a parcel of land for the location of a satellite fire station.

Supervisor Ingalsbe: Said that land originally had been set aside in the Auburn Meadows Subdivision for a fire/ambulance/emergency station but that the fire department said that this would be the wrong location. He said that new proposed site is near Prosecco’s Restaurant on the west side of State Route 332.

Bryan Adams: Asked about public sentiment regarding the pace of the Town’s development.

Ms. Charland: Asked if the Town has a good sense of what the community sees for the future and where they [the community] want the Town to be headed. She asked if there was a sense of what the community wants to be in the future. She suggested that the Committee should ask the community.

Ms. Herendeen: Said that the biggest concern that she has heard is that many people are not aware that the development has been following the first plan from 1965 and subsequent revisions of the Comprehensive Plan through the years. She said that she discussed the history of Farmington recently with the Rotary Club and was forced to talk about the designation of the southwest quadrant for development. Ms. Herendeen said that if you

educate the people and explain why it [the development] was done there, they will understand.

Ms. Herendeen: Said that most people do not know that there has been a 40-year commitment of development in the Town, and that it is not just a hodge podge of development here and there. She said that the education of the people about the plan [for development in the Town] is the underlying importance of everything that the Town does for the people.

Mr. Plante: Discussed having more public input [into the update of the Comprehensive Plan] than just the Public Hearing by the Town Board.

Ms. Charland: Asked about having a full public outreach effort or a light touch. She asked if there would be a risk of getting to a formal Public Hearing and having people upset about the Plan.

Bryan Adams: Said that there will be a benefit to community outreach and to educate the public on the Comprehensive Plan and its benefits. He said that this would provide the community with an opportunity to say that the plan from 40 years ago seems great but how do we adjust to meet in the middle. He said that the southwest quadrant of the Town has been exponential growth in the past 10 years, that the point of the previous plan is well taken, and that education is the key. He suggested the use of the Town website [to inform the public about the update to the Comprehensive Plan].

Ms. Charland: Said that the information about the update to the Comprehensive Plan in the Town Newsletter opened her eyes to this. She said that this is such a methodical process and that it would be so great to share it [with the public].

Supervisor Ingalsbe: Said that a long-time resident read about the development of the Town [in the Town Newsletter] and that he took a number of aerial photographs of recent developments in the Town and submitted them to the Town.

Supervisor Ingalsbe: Said that the Town Board members try to do what is right but that the problem is most people do not come to Town meetings or make their opinions known. He said that the Town Newsletter is sent three times a year and that he hopes to have a monthly newsletter once the Town website is updated. Supervisor Ingalsbe said that most people do not even know that Mr. Brand and Mr. Delpriore post all the current projects on the Town website every month. He said that conducting a survey of the community [regarding the update to the Comprehensive Plan] in the spring would be a great way to receive input and to report what this Committee has been doing.

Mr. Delpriore: Asked if the survey would be distributed prior to the Town Board Public Hearing. Supervisor Ingalsbe said yes.

Mr. Maloy: Discussed community involvement and asked how would we envision getting the public involved. He said that the only time people show up at a Planning Board meeting is when there is a controversial project.

Ms. Charland: Asked if the public needs to receive the details of the Comprehensive Plan. She suggested a much more broad survey via e-mail asking what they would like to see in the future.

Mr. Plante: Suggested that the point of the survey questions could be what the people would like to see in the future. Ms. Charland said that most people may not be thinking in the same level of detail [as in the Plan]. She suggested that the survey could be more informative about what people value, and that it be kept to that level, i.e., open space, parks, etc. She said that the update to the Plan would reflect the comments of the community if this information was fed back into it.

Mr. Maloy: Suggested that the survey or the newsletter could inform the public about the areas of the Town that are projected for growth. He said that a number of people who came to the Planning Board meetings about Hathaway's Corners did not know that this parcel had been identified for future growth. He said that the Town would receive different responses [to a survey] if the people have an overall understanding of the growth areas.

Bryan Adams: Said that there is value in showing an interest in public opinion.

Mr. Giroux: Discussed the types of responses that people often provide on social media.

Bryan Adams: Said that we need to receive feedback in a more controlled way. He suggested that the Committee focus on the Comprehensive Plan and that there are some new people to hear what the public has to say.

Mr. Giroux: Said that usually the Town Board just receives the negative comments on social media and that a number of people just do not take the time to get the facts and information. He said that the Committee must get the information out to them.

Ms. Herendeen: Suggested that the Committee should design a survey to wrap around the focus of the update to the Comprehensive Plan. She said that the material should not be too difficult or too time-consuming to read. She suggested something that abbreviates the Comprehensive Plan and that can be posted on the Town website.

Ms. Charland: Said that there can be a lot of negativity on social media. She suggested having a more official request for feedback from an official committee of the Town. Ms. Charland said that she was thinking of something simple, such as asking residents their experiences, i.e., three things they like about the Town, three things they would like to see improved, etc.

Mr. Plante: Said that it would be worse to have no effort [to receive public input] than not having tried, even if there are only a few responses.

Mr. Sweeney: Asked if composing questions, sending a survey, and receiving the responses is do-able, given the time frame for completion of the update.

Supervisor Ingalsbe: Suggested that the survey be sent in February or March, which would give the Committee time to incorporate the responses in Chapters 3, 4 and 5. He said that he could include information about the survey in the March 2020 issue of the Town Newsletter.

Mr. Sweeney: Asked if we are reaching the majority of the population with Facebook. Supervisor Ingalsbe said that social media may not reach everyone, but that the survey request could be posted on the Town website, on the Town Clerk's and the Supervisor's Facebook pages, and publicized to groups and organizations such as the Rotary Club, the Kiwanis Club, the Chamber of Commerce, and others.

Mr. Gerbasi: Said that it is important now to hear from the residents.

Mr. Brand: Requested that Committee members consider survey questions for discussion at the next meeting.

Re: Establishing the Update Committee for the 2020 Edition of the Town of Farmington Comprehensive Plan; and providing a charge to said Committee.

**WHEREAS**, the Farmington Town Board (hereinafter referred to as Town Board) has the authority that is granted under the provisions of Section 272-a of New York State Town Law to maintain the adopted Town of Farmington Comprehensive Plan (hereinafter referred to as Comprehensive Plan); and

**WHEREAS**, the latest edition of the Comprehensive Plan was adopted by the Town Board, by Resolution #209 of 2011, on July 26, 2011; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board also has the authority under the provisions of Section 272-a of New York State Town Law to appoint a committee and to give said committee a specific charge to undertake, prepare and present to the public an update to the Comprehensive Plan; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board has considered the recommendations received at tonight's meeting from the Town Operations Committee for creating a Comprehensive Plan Committee to be comprised of eleven (11) members; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board has also considered the recommendations received from the Town Director of Planning and Development to have a staff of Town advisors to attend workshop meetings of the Update Committee; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board desires to have a final draft of the update to the Comprehensive Plan officially submitted to the Town Board at its first meeting in May 2020; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board has already directed the Town Director of Planning and Development (hereinafter referred to as Director) to begin working on updates to the various maps contained in the 2011 Edition of the Comprehensive Plan.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Town Board does hereby establish a Comprehensive Plan Update Committee that is to be comprised of a total of eleven (11) members.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Update Committee shall be comprised of the following members: Steven Holtz from the Town Board; Shauncy Maloy from the Town Planning Board; Thomas Yurch from the Town Zoning Board of Appeals; Susan Hilton from the Town Conservation Board; Henry Adams III from the Town Agriculture Advisory Committee; Donna Herendeen, Town Historian; and the following Town residents: Bryan Adams, Susan Hopkins Charland, Tim DeLucia, David Plante and Arron Sweeney.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the following individuals are hereby appointed to serve as Advisors to the Update Committee: Don Giroux, Town Highway and Parks Superintendent; Robin MacDonald, Town Water and Sewer Superintendent; Julie LaRue, Town Recreation Advisory Committee; Dan Delpriore, Town Code Enforcement Officer; John Robortella, Clerk of the Update Committee; and Ronald L. Brand, Town Director of Planning and Development.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Comprehensive Plan Update Committee shall work directly with the Director of Development in making the various amendments to the adopted Town of Farmington Comprehensive Plan for presentation to the Town Board for its consideration and acceptance; and for the commencement of the official amendment process required under New York State Town Law.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that John Robortella is hereby appointed to serve as the Clerk to the Update Committee and to assist the Director of Development in making the final editing changes to the 2020 Edition of the Town of Farmington Comprehensive Plan.

**BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED** that the Director of Planning and Development shall serve as their chairperson of said Committee and shall be responsible for preparing meeting agendas, meeting notices, various updates to the chapters of the Comprehensive Plan and provide periodic reports to the Town Board.
