A Message from Your President

In October, we lost two long-time members of the Civil War Round Table, Sylvia Gault and Ruth Turney.

- Sylvia Gault passed away on October 11, 2016, at the age of 78. Sylvia was born on February 7, 1938, in Creighton MO. She graduated from Park College in 1960 with a degree in Home Economics. She married Paul Gault in 1964. Sylvia and Paul served as treasurers of the Round Table for many years. Sylvia worked at Park College and was an active member of the Parkville Presbyterian Church in Parkville MO. She served as secretary and treasurer of her church for 33 years. Sylvia also had a passion for local history and genealogy. She was an expert regarding the history of Parkville, Park College, and Parkville Presbyterian Church. I will always remember Sylvia for greeting everyone when they checked in at the treasurers' table at our dinner meetings. I also remember Sylvia's smile, especially when I asked her at dinner one night, how she and Paul met. Paul and Sylvia have a son named Edwin.
- **Ruth Turney** died on October 9, 2016, at the age of 87 at her home in Lawrence KS. Ruth was born on November 25, 1928, in New Bedford MA. She graduated from Brown University in 1949 with a degree in mathematics. She married Austin Turney in 1951. Ruth later earned a masters degree in English literature from Western Connecticut State University and a masters degree in library science from Southern Connecticut State University. She worked for the Ferguson Library in Stamford CT. Ruth was an active member of the Trinity Episcopal Church in Lawrence KS. Ruth used to come to the Round Table dinner meetings with her husband, Austin, and their son, Austin C. Turney. Ruth lived with her husband in a very historic house in Lawrence. In May of 2013, the Round Table took a bus trip to Lawrence, following the route of Quantrill's Raid. During the tour, the bus driver drove right past the Turney's house. The Turneys offered to give the Round Table members a tour of their house. That was a very gracious offer.

The Civil War Round Table of Kansas City did not allow women members until 1981. Thank goodness that rule was changed. Sylvia and Ruth both helped to make the Round Table what it is today. They will be truly missed by all who knew them.

Meet Our Speaker

Dr. **Paul Kahan** earned a Ph.D. in U.S. history from Temple University where he worked with William W. Cutler, III. Prior to that, Dr. Kahan earned his M.A. in Modern American History & Literature from Drew University and B.A.s in history and English (with minors in medieval/Renaissance studies and music) from Alfred University.

In 2008, Dr. Kahan published his first book, *Eastern State Penitentiary: A History*. This book explores the penitentiary's history and is written for a popular audience. In February 2012, Peter Lang published Dr. Kahan's second book, *Seminary of Virtue: The Ideology and Practice of Inmate Reform at Eastern State Penitentiary*, 1829-1971. His third book, *The Homestead Strike: Labor, Violence, and American Industry*, was published by Routledge in late 2013. He recently published his fourth book, a biography of Lincoln's first Secretary of War, Simon Cameron.

December 20, 2016: **Dr. Ian Michael Spurgeon** has been rescheduled to speak about the 1st Kansas Colored Infantry. Mr. Spurgeon's new book is titled: *Soldiers in the Army of Freedom*. Mr. Spurgeon lives in Washington D.C.

2017 Speaker Schedule

January 24, 2017: Round Table member Arnold Schofield will give a program titled: "The Frontier Guard." Arnold's talk will be based on James P. Muehlberger's book: *The 116: The True Story of Abraham Lincoln's Lost Guard*. This book was published in December of 2015 and is the definitive account of the Frontier Guard who defended President Lincoln from a

kidnapping and assassination plot in the opening days of the Civil War.

February 28, 2017: Civil War Round Table member **Dan Smith** will give a program on Edward F. Winslow, who led the 4th Iowa Cavalry at the Battle of Westport. **Dick Titterington** has edited the unpublished Civil War memoirs of Edward F. Winslow and is planning to publish the book sometime in 2016. Dan wrote the foreword for the book and has done quite a bit of research on the life of Winslow. Winslow is a fascinating individual. The talk would not be a story of battles, but rather a story of Winslow the man, kind of a Horatio Alger story.

March 28, 2017: John Liepa, sports editor from Des Moines IA, will be giving a program about baseball in the Civil War.

April 25, 2017: Round Table member **Lane Smith** will give a first person presentation on Confederate General Robert E. Lee.

May 23, 2017: Dr. Justin S. Solonick will be discussing his book titled: *Engineering Victory, The Union Siege of Vicksburg*. This book was published in April of 2015 and deals with the implements and tactics that Grant's soldiers used to achieve victory. Mr. Solonick is a former adjunct instructor in the Department of History and Geography at Texas Christian University.

June 27, 2017: Dr. Timothy B. Smith will be speaking about his latest book titled: *Shiloh, Conquer or Perish*, that was published in 2014. Dr. Smith is a former National Park Service Ranger at Shiloh and currently teaches history at the University of Tennessee at Martin. He has written numerous books on the Civil War.

July 25, 2017: Rev. George C. Wunderlich, Assistant Director for Human Formation at Mount St.Mary's Seminary, will be speaking about the U. S. Army Medical Corps. Rev. Wunderlich previously served as Executive Director of the National Museum of Civil War Medicine in Frederick MD.

August 22, 2017: Rich Gillespie will be speaking about Confederate cavalry officer John S. Mosby and the Mosby Heritage Foundation. Colonel Mosby was known as the "Grey Ghost" and commanded the 43d Battalion, 1st Virginia Cavalry. This unit became known as "Mosby's Rangers" or "Mosby's Raiders."

September 26, 2017: John Michael Priest will be speaking about the Battle of South Mountain, which was the prelude to Antietam. Mr. Priest is a Civil War historian/author and a tour guide at Antietam National Battlefield.

October 24, 2017: Dr. Kyle S. Sinisi, Professor of History at The Citadel, will be speaking about his book titled: *The Last Hurrah, Sterling Price's Missouri Expedition of 1864* that was published in July of 2015.

November 28, 2017: Dr. John T. Kuehn, the William A. Stofft, Chair of Historical Research at the U.S.

Army Command and General Staff College, will be speaking about Gideon Welles, Gus Fox, and the U. S. Naval Blockade.

December 19, 2017: Round Table members Herschel and Jacque Stroud will give a presentation titled: "Abe and Mary, a Family Portrait." This talk is based on the book written by Harold Holzer and Robert Neely, regarding the Lincoln's family photograph album, which they kept in the White House. The album was lost until 1985, rediscovered, and Holzer and Neely produced their book on the album titled: *The Lincoln Family Album*. Herschel and Jacque will appear in period dress, but not as Abe and Mary, but as Herschel and Jacque, commenting on the book and its ramifications.

Sergeant Major's Roar

Arnold Schofield will be back next month with a special column for the Christmas season. For this month, your intrepid editor offers the following substitution.

Price's Retreat from Missouri

It was November 1864, and Maj. Gen. Sterling Price has moved his defeated Confederate army into Arkansas, still being pursued by Maj. Gen. Samuel R. Curtis. Price's destination was Camden in southwestern Arkansas. With the news of Federal reinforcements at Little Rock and Fort Smith, Price detoured his retreat into the Indian Territory.

I determined not to risk the crossing of the Arkansas between Fort Smith and Little Rock, on which route I could not procure subsistence, forage, or grass in anything like sufficient quantity, but I decided to cross through the Indian country, where beef at least could be obtained.

On November 7, Price crossed the Arkansas River west of Fort Smith, and the Federals called off their pursuit. But problems continued to mount for the Confederate army. Brig. Gen. Jo Shelby wrote about the retreat in his official report.

After crossing the Arkansas River provisions were scarce, flour a myth, and salt numbered with the things that were. Yet we got along as well as could be expected, and only when actually suffering did I ask of General Price permission to return to the Canadian [River] and kill and jerk beef. After losing many valuable horses and resorting to almost every expedient to get my battery through, I arrived at Boggy Depot [Indian Territory] with my command tired, weary, and very hungry.

After crossing the Arkansas River, Price divided his command into three columns. Maj. Gen. James F. Fagan headed southeast and reentered southwestern Arkansas. The other two columns crossed the Red River into Texas before crossing the Red River again, arriving in Laynesport, Arkansas on December 2, 1864.

Shelby's adjutant, Maj. John N. Edwards described the retreat in his book written after the war.

After crossing the Arkansas the worst stage of misery came upon the army, and the sufferings were intense. Horses died by thousands; the few wagons were abandoned almost without exception; the sick had no medicines and the healthy no food; the army had no organization and the subordinate officers no hope. Bitter freezing weather added terrors to the route and weakness to the emaciated, staggering column. Small-pox came at last, as the natural consequence, and hundreds fell out by the way-side to perish without help and to be devoured by coyotes without a burial.

A newspaper editor after the war, Edwards writing has always struck me as melodramatic.


