#### EDWIN (Ed) EILERT

During 2010, Ed was elected to serve as Johnson County Commission Chairman and re-elected in 2014. He served as Overland Park Mayor, 1981-2005. This highly respected community leader has a strong passion for the commitment to support education and economic development.

#### **GENERAL RICHARD BOWMAN MYERS (Retired)**

General Richard Myers became the 15th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on October 1, 2001. In this capacity, he served as the principal military advisor to the President, the Secretary of Defense and the National Security Council during the earliest stages of the War on Terror, including planning and execution of the 2002 invasion of Iraq. He replaced retiring General Hugh Shelton.

Retired General Merrill McPeak made the following comment regarding Myers:

# **"Myers**" preparation from day one has been to use his imagination, and that's what's required here. General Myers was more of a Gary Cooper than a John Wayne".

General Myers retired from active military duty, September 30, 2005.

On April 14, 2016, Richard Myers was selected as the interim President of Kansas State University. On November 15, 2016, the Board of Regents removed his interim title and announced Myers would become the University's 14th President.

While he enjoys music, plays the saxophone, golf and tennis, he is best known in the media for his penchant for Harley-Davidsons and repairing beat-up classic cars.

Kansas City Missouri Bicentennial Celebration Held at the NEW Francois Chouteau & Native American Heritage Fountain

special Missouri Bicentennial celebration was held on Saturday, July 24. 2021, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., at the NEW Francois Chouteau & Native American Heritage Fountain at 3904 NE Chouteau Trafficway, Kansas City, MO. A large crowd of perhaps 200 people attended, not only to celebrate the 200th Anniversary of Missouri's statehood (August 10, 1821), but to dedicate the very impressive Heritage Fountain park.

The celebration was supported by the City of Kansas City, KC Parks, Northland Neighborhoods Inc., and Missouri's Bicentennial Committee.

Pictured above is the Celebration's central area including one of the many information tents, the stone platform with three figures on top and at the far right is the covered stage where much of the entertainment took place.

Numerous info tables and tents were active displaying Osage Indian artifacts, fur trapping, puppetry, and information by other KC area and MO State historical preservation and conservation organizations. Food trucks were available, and children activities, artists, and other activities were ongoing, as well as information tables appropriate by KC Pr

tables sponsored by KC Parks and Recreation.

In conjunction with this landmark commemoration was the 30-min. Missouri Bicentennial program which included brief remarks by area elected officials, community leaders, and others. The M/C of the programs was retired Kansas City Parks and Recre-

ation Director Mark McHenry. One of the featured speakers was KCAHTA's President Gary L. Hicks.

Gary (at right), in his capacity as 2010 President of The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City, awarded its distinguished Lee I. Pickering Award to Ms. Dana Nelson, the widow of Mr. R. Keith Nelson who recently passed away. It was Mr. Nelson's vision of over 10 years ago that Kansas City should plan and erect a monument in commemoration of Missouri's 200th Anniversary on August 10, 2021!

#### Note: Missouri was acquired as part of the 1803 Louisiana Purchase and named for the Native Americans who originally inhabited the land.

Keith themed the monument to include the French pioneer Francois Chouteau, the widely acknowledged Founding Father of Kansas City, Chouteau established the area's first fur trading post in 1819, located on the north side of the nearby Missouri River. Included in Keith's theme is the influence of the Native American Indian, particularly the Osage, who occupied this region during the period Chouteau had his trading post.

Over the years, Keith fundamentally led the project's design, construction, and funding activities. A few years ago, NSDKC presented a \$15,000 Sponsorship Grant to Keith. Phase 2 of the project shall include water features depicting a fountain and the Missouri River, to further enhance the story of the bronze figures of Chouteau and native Osages standing on the bluff!

At the close of the dedication program was the unveiling of the 4th bronze statue (at right) being featured at the Fountain. The Osage 'Hunter' is stalking a bronze beaver hiding within a nearby log just in front of the camera!

This was a very well planned event concerning key historical events in Kansas City's history!
