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Native Sons Follow in Footsteps of Lewis & Clark

Visit to Fort Osage Echoes Corps of Discovery's Voyage Through Area 200 Years Ago

Join your fellow Native Sons on Saturday, June 19th, as they follow in the footsteps of Lewis & Clark with a visit to Fort Osage.

Step through the gate at Fort Osage and begin your walk through history. This reconstructed historic Fort, overlooking the Missouri River is reconstructed as it in 1812. Located the farthest west of the

twenty-eight factories in the United States' trade system, Fort Osage functioned as one the first military outposts and government trade houses in the Louisiana Territory.

The site was first noted by Lewis and Clark as a likely spot for a fort because of its "high commanding position, more than 70 feet above highwater mark, and overlooking the river, which is here but of little depth" as William Clark noted.

Built in 1808, under the direction of William Clark as part of the vast federally controlled fur trade system, the Fort's mission was the maintenance of the political stability in the region through trade and military alliances with the Indian tribes, and in particular, the Osage Nation. Fort Osage remained a part of the US Factory system until the whole Indian trade system was shut down in 1822. It remained a military storage facility in support of Ft. Atkinson, Nebraska until 1827, when both were closed upon the commencement of the construction of Ft. Leavenworth.

The Native Sons of Greater Kansas City was the catalyst in the late 1940's for the restoration of Fort Osage, so be sure to attend this event to not only learn a little more about the frontier and Lewis & Clark, but to take pride in one of the Native Sons' many accomplishments. JN

Antioch Community Church received a historic marker from the Native Sons of Greater Kansas City and an official proclamation from the State of Missouri highlighting its importance to the Northland for over 150 years. The church is located at 4805 NE Antioch Road in Gladstone.

Members of the Native Sons of Greater Kansas City and the Antioch Community Church Congregation were in attendance. Immediate Past President John Dillingham officially represented the Native Sons while Rev. Gerald Brown, Church Pastor, spoke on behalf of Antioch Community Church.

In addition to the

unveiling of the historic marker which can be seen from Antioch Road, an official proclamation from Missouri's General Assembly was read by Tom Sims, Historian for the Native Sons outlining the history of the Antioch Community Church. The proclamation was sponsored in the General

Assembly by State R e p s D a n Bishop a n d Trent Skaggs.

The Antioch C o m - munity Church

began as a satellite of the Liberty Christian Church in 1853. Its first meeting house, a one room church, was built in 1859 at a cost of \$1800 and still stands as one of the oldest buildings in Clay County, Missouri. It is still active as at least one Sunday worship service is held there each week.

During its early incarnation the church was known as the Disciples of Christ Church and many of its early parishioners' names like Vivion and Davidson now grace the street signs in Gladstone and Kansas City North. The church received its more familiar name of Antioch Community Church in 1930, JN

UPCOMING LEWIS & CLARK EVENTS

Only 28 years after America declared its independence, Meriwether Lewis and William Clark celebrated a unique Fourth of July here in the Heart of the America. Exploring the unknown Louisiana Territory for President Thomas Jefferson, the Corps of Discovery expedition launched from St. Louis on a historic route to the Pacific Ocean through uncharted land and rivers.

The first Independence Day observance west of the Mississippi in 1804 consisted of two blasts from a keelboat's cannon on the banks of the Missouri river just outside Atchison, Kan-

sas. Over the next two years, President Jefferson's Corps of Discovery would travel thousands of miles in unknown territory, coming face to face with people no U.S. citizen had ever seen.

Two hundred years later, the Heartland of America-specifically the cities of Kansas City, Leavenworth and Atchison-will launch a grand Commemoration of events entitled Heart of America: A Journey Fourth, July 3-4, 2004. From a soaring air show to a multi-voiced reading of the Declaration of Independence, America will be treated to a breathtaking celebration on July 4, 2004. JN
