The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City was the first private sector organization to issue a proclamation supporting the restoration and expansion of Liberty Memorial, the nation's only monument and museum to World War I. The Museum was selected as "Favorite Museum or Historical Site" in the 2008 KC Visitors' Choice Awards. The Visitors' Awards are the only awards that are chosen exclusively by visitors to Kansas City.

Located in the Liberty Memorial Courtyard, the Memorial Day ceremony begins at 10 a.m. and will include performances by the American Legion Band and speeches to pay tribute to the day's significance.

Free parking and shuttle service are available on May 27 from parking lots at Grand and 27th Streets from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. This event is supported by the Neighborhood Tourist Development Fund.

While the ceremony is free to the public, regular admission fees apply to tour the Museum, which will be open from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.

onversation with Hall of Famer George Brett, musical entertainment, a silent auction, and an award presentation are part of the evening festivities being planned to honor George Brett as the 2013 Outstanding Kansas Citian. This year's OKC dinner and award ceremony will be held in the Diamond Club at Kauffman Stadium with Ford C. Frick Award winning Royals announcer, Denny Matthews, serving as emcee for the evening.

Musical entertainment and a silent auction, including baseball memorabilia from the Royals and George Brett, will precede the dinner and award ceremony. Following the award presentation, Frank Boal, long-time sports reporter in Kansas City, will join Brett onstage for a conversation about Brett's years as a Royals player and his community projects since retirement.

The evening will also include the unveiling of a new NSDKC marker commemorating the history of the Negro Leagues baseball and the formation, in 1920, of the Negro National League in Kansas City. The marker will be placed in a permanent location on the grounds of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum at a later date.

In addition to recognizing an outstanding member of the community, the annual OKC event has become a major fundraising activity that allows our organization to finance programs that promote and preserve area history. #### **Community Service Committee Reports**

#### **Historical Markers**

The committee's work is nearly finished on the Platte Purchase marker, but we are awaiting news of partnering with Liberty, Missouri, entities.

The Negro Leagues Baseball Museum plaque marker text is being worked on by the committee. A grant has been received from the Neighborhood Development Trust Fund which will cover the cost of the NLBM marker.

The American Jazz Museum reports that they will be installing the plaque marker from last year as weather permits. A dedication will be held soon after the installation.

There is no shortage of requests coming to NSDKC from historic sites to consider doing one of our markers. Always the issues are: is there some financial partnering offered, is there time for our research and editing process to be completed, and will it fit into our budget. Our primary mission is to get markers erected at historic sites

#### Smithsonian exhibition at area museum

The traveling Smithsonian exhibition entitled, "Native Words: Code Talkers" will be on display through June 29th, at the Wyandotte County Historical Society and Museum. Native Americans played a big role in helping the United States defeat Japan in World War II. Chester Nez, now in his 90s, is the last living member of the 421 Navaho code talkers. His mission was so secret that he could not talk about until 23 years after the war.

The Japanese knew when and where the United States was about to strike certain places because they knew English. But by using the

Navajo language, and other tribal languages, the Japanese could never break the code. World War II might not have ended before even more civilians and soldiers were killed if it was not for the valiant Navaho code talkers.

As a child I was forbidden to speak my Native language at school. Later my country asked me to. My language helped win the war, and that makes me very proud. Very proud.
