





The Monument is to be erected on the west side of the 5.2 acre Ilus Davis Park located north of City Hall, at 10th and Oak Streets, Kansas City, Missouri.

The vision for such a Monument was presented to the NSDKC Board in the spring of 2013 by Mr. Carl DiCapo (2015 NSDKC President), and he designated 2010 NSDKC President Gary L. Hicks to create a conceptual design to reflect the heritage of our Greater Kansas City Metropolitan Area, and to represent the mission of The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City. 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MISSION

The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City, Inc. is dedicated to the historic preservation of the unique and rich heritage of the greater Kansas City metropolitan area, both in Missouri and Kansas, through advocacy, education and restoration. It also seeks to preserve and maintain archives of historical interest relating to the development of the Kansas City region and to recognize individuals who have resided therein and contributed to such development.



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
past is integral to the Monument's design.

Community leaders across the region enthusiastically support this project. The Monument Project Committee, led by NSDKC Past President Carl DiCapo, includes members of NSDKC, representatives from J.E. Dunn Construction Co., and BNIM Architects, Inc.

The Monument's design includes the following primary elements:

- An imposing 16-ft high x five-pointed star-shape tower providing ten exposed faces around its perimeter represents the 10 regional counties which is the NSDKC focus area:
- Kansas counties (Leavenworth, Wyandotte, Johnson, Miami)
- Missouri counties (Platte, Clay, Cass, Ray, Jackson, Lafayette)
- Each of the five points of the tower's star-shaped design (5'-6" from 'point-to-point') represents the primary aspects of the NSDKC mission:
- Historical Preservation
- Education
- Advocacy
- Charity
- General welfare of the greater Kansas City region
- The 16-ft high tower will be constructed of precast concrete units formed in a classic five-pointed star-shape. The tower height reflects the character strengths and virtues embraced by our Greater Kansas City community found within Wisdom and Knowledge; Courage, Humanity, Justice, Temperance, and Transcendence.
- 10 laser-etched aluminum panels, installed on each face
 of the five-pointed star tower, are themed with the primary attributes of our community's heritage, including
 the early cultures and explorers, western expansion, transportation, agriculture, entrepreneurs, arts and education,
 science and research, sports, the distinct grandeur of our
 region, and a tribute to The Native Sons and Daughters
 of Greater Kansas City.
- A landscaped plaza area with inscribed granite paving units feature themes such as recipients of NSDKC's Outstanding Kansas Citian Award; NSDKC's Past Presidents; NSDKC preservation projects; and its historical markers program. (note: granite paving units shall be available for sponsorship, similar to the many other 'sponsored brick programs' conducted in our region.

A wayside exhibit will be located adjoining the plaza area describing the features of the Monument, including a description of the Monument's design elements, recognition of significant project funding donors, and project committee



members and sponsors.

The Monument will set in a visible and prestigious location within Ilus Davis Park, just north of the heroic bronze statue of Mayor Davis located at 11th & Oak Streets, allowing for appropriate walkway access with handicap accessibility, lighting, landscaping, and plantings. (note: Mr. Davis was Mayor of Kansas City, Missouri from 1963-1972.)

The July 13 Groundbreaking Ceremony will include public officials, community leaders, and members of the NSDKC organization turning the first shovels of dirt as the construction phase begins. Refreshments and music will be provided. Limited curbside parking will be provided on Locust Street and additional parking will be available at the J.E. Dunn parking garage located east of the park at 1001 Locust Street.

The Monument is in its final design stage with construction scheduled for completion this fall. At that time a formal dedication event will be planned to dedicate the Monument to past, present and future generations of our Greater Kansas City Metropolitan Area!

Strang Line Car Barn, NSDKC marker re-dedicated


n Friday, June 30 we re-dedicated a "Native Sons of Kansas City" plaque (right) that had been first installed in 1989 on the historic 1906 Strang Line Car Barn at 79th and Santa Fe Drive in downtown Overland Park, occupied today by Traditions Furniture. It had fallen off a few years ago and had been safely stored in the Strang Carriage House (built in 1915) at 8045 Santa Fe Drive, home of the Overland Park Historical Society (OPHS).

Dave Comer, Past President of OPHS arranged to have it restored and re-mounted. Traditions Furniture held a reception, sponsored by OPHS, after the ceremony.

About 32 people attended on a fine morning after all the heavy rains the previous two days.

Speakers at the event included Terry Happer-Scheier, Overland Park City Council Ward #1, and Florent Wagner (middle right) who is easily the most knowledgeable historian about Overland Park and the Strang Line that enabled Overland Park to develop. The last speaker was our own Gary L. Hicks (lower right), who talked about NSDKC and our markers program. Ross Marshall served as the M/C.

It is encouraging to see the importance that other people and organizations place on our historical markers!

NSDKC 85 HISTORY

NSDKC changes during 85 years

uring 2017, each newsletter under the above heading will contain one or more short bullet points concerning our history.

In 2006 our membership voted to approve changing the organization's name from "The Native Sons of Kansas City, Missouri" to "The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City." At that time, women were given full membership in the organization and at that same event, Eileen S. Sullivan was installed as the first female president.

Our organization was first named "The Native Sons of Kansas City" in 1932. Then in 1938, the name was changed to "The Native Sons of Kansas City, Missouri". Today, since our name has nine words in it, we quite often use the abbreviation "NSDKC".

As an additional note, President Diane Pepper has urged us to have a focus on this year being our 85th Anniversary. Accordingly, Diane, Dan Creasy, Gary Hicks and Ross Marshall met recently and discussed how we could produce an 85th Anniversary History Booklet by the end of this year. So we, and anyone else who is interested, will be using our August 19 event at the UMKC Newcomb Hall as a launching date for researching our history to produce the History Booklet.

NSDKC History Day winners tell compelling stories

At the Missouri State Historical Society's annual High School History Day competition in Columbia, Missouri on Saturday April 21, 2017, Mary Lee Sturdevant and Dan Sturdevant enjoyed the presentation of several high school contestants for the NSDKC history award.

The winner of The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City award was a 15 minute performance by four Liberty High School students. *Writing History: The Mary Paxton Keeley Story* was performed by Harrison Frawley, Brianna Wagoner, Mary Shepherd and Christina Mackenzie. Our \$100 award was split four ways and each also received a NSDKC Certificate.

The four students moved seamlessly from one scene to another scene describing the life of this woman who had a fine career as a woman journalist. The last scene was the White House ceremony showing Ms. Keely receiving an award in 1989 from President George H. W. Bush. As an aside, earlier in her life she had been best friends with Bess Truman.

Ms. Keely in 1908 was the first woman admitted to the University of Missouri Journalism School and became the first female reporter in the Kansas City area. *The Kansas City Star* rejected her job application because she was a woman, but the *Kansas City Post* hired her.

A couple of her famous articles were 1910s, the Red Light District in Kansas City and Chillicothe, Missouri Training Center Exposé.

Trivia contest at Alexander Majors Barn
