In August, NSDKC began its celebration of this year's Outstanding Kansas Citian festivities by participating in the 37th annual Ethnic Enrichment Festival. We joined more than 60 other cultural organizations with a booth to share NSDKC's history with the community.

Have you marked your calendar for the 2015 Outstanding Kansas Citian Award Dinner? This year's Outstanding Kansas Citian, former Kansas City Mayor Kay Barnes, and the Ethnic Enrichment Commission have been important parts of my life. My career was spent in downtown Kansas City. I saw it in the days of hustle and bustle and saw it in its declining years. I cannot express how happy I am to have lived to see it revitalized. The foresight of Kay Barnes to lead the fight that brought renewed energy and life to our downtown makes her a special Outstanding Kansas Citian.

At the same time, to honor the Ethnic Enrichment Commission brings to full circle an important part of my service to the community. In 1977, I co-chaired the founding of the Ethnic Enrichment Commission, a program whose groundwork had been laid a year earlier while I chaired the city's participation in the national bicentennial celebration. Kansas City received honors for this effort from the National Bicentennial Committee. I am delighted to see how it has grown and become a special part of our community.

As we celebrate our history, NSDKC also builds new pathways to ensure that our past remains relevant. This year, we established the Founder's membership level. Under the direction of Chris Sizemore, 16 organizations now belong to that group.

Finally, I want to announce that we have reached an agreement with the city to erect a monument to honor the Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City. We believe the monument will be placed in a park-like setting near 43rd and Southwest Trafficway. You'll hear more about this as plans are finalized, but I am pleased to see the work of our organization recognized and held in honor by the community.

We have elected our 2016 officers and board members at the annual meeting and are prepared to begin to look ahead to next year. What an honor it has been for me to lead The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kansas City!

Progress on Native Sons & Daughters Monument

n Monday, Oct 5, an NSDKC committee led by President Carl DiCapo met with members of the Kansas City Parks and Recreation Board to discuss alternative locations for placement of the proposed NSDKC monument. Several options have previously been considered, but the focus at this meeting was one of the most highly visible and accessible locations in mid-town Kansas City at 43rd and Southwest Trafficway.

Since that meeting, Carl has continued to meet with city officials to finalize this decision.

The NSDKC Monument Committee is excited about this proposed location and appreciates its partnership with Kansas City Parks and Recreation on this project.

In 2013, the Board approved the concept and preliminary design of the monument which will be dedicated to and represents:

- The people who explored and occupied the land of what has become the Greater Kansas City Metropolitan Area
- The pioneers whose vision, fortitude and dedication were the foundations upon which Kansas City would rise
- The pioneers who were part of the great Western Expansion migration movement of the 1800s, which nurtured the growth and development of this region
- The visionaries, entrepreneurs, and 'founders' who built trades which became the strong fabric of commerce for the strong fabric of commerce fabric
- The arts and sciences which enhance the quality and value of experience
- Education and research which is a cornerstone of our Greater Ka community
- The mission of The Native Sons and Daughters of Greater Kassas (1) The Market of the 10 regional counties it serves on both the Kansas and Misso right of the State Line
- Those native sons and daughters of an earlier era who organized as preserve the history and heritage of our area's past.

Upcoming marker dedications

he Historical Markers Committee is awaiting delivery on two markers that will be dedicated within the next month. Final dates are being determined at the time of this newsletter publication. When each of the dates is final, email blasts will be sent out to our members.

Ethnic Enrichment Commission marker

This marker will be presented to the Commission at the Outstanding Kansas Citian Gala on the evening of November 10. Likely the dedication will take place about a week later.

The location will be near the Meyer Boulevard entrance to Swope Park.

Harlem marker

The marker will be installed the week of November 16. The dedication will likely be November 20.

The location is on the roundabout next to the Charles B. Wheeler Downtown Airport at the north end of the Broadway Bridge.

2015 Ethnic Enrichment Festival OR Feel the World Beat in the Heart of America

hat is Kansas City known for? Certainly the Kansas City Royals, the Kansas City Chiefs and Kansas City Sporting, all of which have made our city proud.

However, there is a lesser known event that has existed and prospered for over 35 years in Kansas City, and to the city's diverse population, rivals the above mentioned athletic teams.

The 36th Annual Ethnic Enrichment Festival was held the weekend of August 21 - 23 in Swope Park during, what many would say was the best festival weather ever! The sun was bright, the sky was clear and the crowds were extremely large. The Festival was not the only thing in town that weekend. We "competed" against the Kansas City Air Show, a Friday night Chiefs game, three successive nights of Starlight Shows, and still had record breaking crowds. How can a Midwestern average sized City support all these activities?

As it turns out, very easily. We just have to sit back and pick and choose what we want to do on the weekends. Since the Festival has been around so long and we have strived to keep it on the same weekend each year, it has a significant following. We have also found out that many of our guests photographed the foods being offered and posted them on Facebook for their friends and followers.

There is nothing better than to share the sweet smells of various ethnic foods being prepared at our Festival site. Watching a tent full of Bolivian women sitting around a table preparing Empanadas for serving later in the day; seeing how Indian Fry Bread is prepared for Indian Tacos; watching as the Irish Commission sells massive amounts of smoked turkey legs. These are the sights, sounds and smells of the Festival.

This year, we hosted over 42,000 visitors as they came to enjoy the food,
