Carl J. Dicapo Passed April 26, 2023



A big loss! **Carl** was a long-time valuable supportive member of NSDKC. He was NSDKC President in 2015 and was on our Board of Directors for many years. **Carl** was also our OKC Honoree in 2001.

He spearheaded the fundraising for the NSDKC Monument that we erected in 2018 at Ilus Davis Park in downtown Kansas City at 10th and Oak.

Carl was our Membership Committee Chair for over 10 years and enlisted many new members. He was also a member of the OKC Committee for many years.

Carl was a very loyal Kansas Citian and for so many years was an officer, leader and fundraiser with many organizations such as Liberty Memorial Association and City of Fountains.

He spent 46 years as Manager and part owner of the wonderful Italian Gardens Restaurant in downtown Kansas City.

He is buried at Mount Olive Cemetery.

NSDKC Tour at J. Rieger & Co. Distillery

n Wednesday, May 17 we enjoyed a guided tour of the magnificent J. Rieger & Co. distillery. It was arranged by NSDKC past president and current Program Chair Linn Mills. We gathered there before 6:00 p.m. and were led by an excellent guide through the huge distillery as he described not only what they distill but how they do it.

Jacob Rieger immigrated to America from Goritz, Austria in 1877. That year, Jacob founded the J. Rieger & Co. distillery in Kansas City's West Bottoms, directly across from the Livestock Exchange Building. 21 years later in 1898, the first official listing of J. Rieger & Co. claimed to be the largest mail-order whiskey house in the U.S. with a customer base of 250,000 or more! The

distillery offered over 100 unique products ranging from whiskey to gins, rums and even stomach bitters!

J. Rieger & Co. reached customers across the country through direct mail and advertisements. Recipients completed the order form and mailed it to J. Rieger & Co. with payment. Orders were then fulfilled and J. Rieger & Co. products were shipped all over the country.

The company thrived on this business model until the U. S. Eighteenth Amendment was passed in 1919 making the production, sale and transport of intoxicating liquors illegal. Like most breweries and distilleries across the country, Alexander Rieger was forced to shut the doors of J. Rieger and Co. in December, 1919.

Shortly after, Alexander Rieger Mercantile Company and Alexander Rieger Investment Company were listed at the same address of the once thriving J. Rieger distillery. Sometime around the 1950s, the original distillery was razed to make way for a parking lot!

J. Rieger & Co. was reestablished in October, 2014 by Ryan Maybee and Andy Rieger, Jacob Rieger's great-great-great grandson.

The distillery is now located in the East Bottoms neighborhood in Kansas City, just three and a half miles from the original location in the West Bottoms.

J. Rieger & Co. products are currently distributed in states from Delaware to Texas to Minnesota including Missouri and Kansas. It is truly a distillery of high stature in our nation!

After the tour, we enjoyed a tasting session. Then we had an optional light dinner and refreshments, at our own expense, at the wonderful Electric Park patio pictured above.

Highland Farms Marker Dedicated May 30, 2023

was a very wonderful dedication on Tuesday, May 30 of NSDKC's 43rd upright marker on a post! A little cloudy to begin with but the sun soon was bright. Over 40 people attended at the site of Highland Park Elementary School at 400 SE Millstone Avenue, just east of Lee's Summit, Missouri as shown in the pictures above.

This site is actually on a segment of the original large Highland Farms which was 7600 acres, the largest farm in Missouri in the 1920s and was owned by **Milton Thompson**. It was famous for being the world's largest registered Hereford breeding farm.

The Dedication was opened at 10:30 a.m. by Master of Ceremonies **Ross Marshall**, NSDKC Past-President and Chair of the Markers Committee, as he greeted and welcomed the attendees.

Jodi Mallette, Principal of the School, then greeted the attendees and reviewed the value and accomplishments of the School.

The next speaker was **Gary Hicks**, NSDKC Past-President and member of the Markers Committee (in white jacket), who discussed the history and heritage of Highland Farms in great detail. **Gary** and his wife **Louise**, niece of **Louise Willig Rehn**, are the ones that paid for the marker.

His remarks were in great detail and supported much of what is displayed on the marker that appears in the center of the picture with a blue veil on it.

The next speaker was **Sue Hart**, Membership and Volunteer Chair for Lee's Summit Historical Society and Museum. She invited us to visit the Museum, at no charge, which is in the center of downtown Lee's Summit. And many of us did!

After the speakers finished, it was time to unveil the marker.

n Friday, June 16 twentyfive or so NSDKC members met at the house of **Steve** and **Marianne Noll** to see and experience their MAR-VELOUS collection of Kansas City History memorabilia, artifacts and ephemera. The event was sponsored by NSDKC.

The house at left in Prairie Village is where all of it is stored. They actually live in the house to the right of it.

The collection has been accumulated over several decades primarily by **Steve** and is displayed on countless tables, shelves, large glass-window cabinets, on walls, etc. throughout both floors of the house. Some of the artifacts are displayed on the shelves, cabinets, etc. as shown in the picture to the left. **Steve Noll** is standing at right in the dark blue shirt.
