SERMON TEXT- Luke 14:25-33

²⁵Now large crowds were traveling with [Jesus;] & he turned & said to them, ²⁶"Whoever comes to me & does not hate father & mother, wife & children, brothers & sisters, yes, & even life itself, cannot be my disciple. ²⁷Whoever does not carry the cross & follow me cannot be my disciple. ²⁸For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down & estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? ²⁹Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation & is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, ³⁰saying, 'This fellow began to build & was not able to finish.' ³¹Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first & consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? ³²If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation & asks for the terms of peace. ³³So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions."

LISTENING TO ...

GOD- Christian life is rooted in the Father, Son, & Holy Spirit

- 1. How do vv25-33 connect with 14:15-24? What about 12:49-53?
- 2. What connections do you find between Luke above & Philemon 1-21? By the way, it seems St. Paul is subtly making the case for Philemon to grant Onesimus' freedom. Hint: look for themes, parallel ideas, inversions, reversals, similarities, extensions, metaphors, actions, vocabulary, grammar, etc.

EACH OTHER- Sharing & growing with our brothers & sisters in Christ

- 3. "Hate" (v26) means to make a strong, stark distinction, choosing one thing over another. It doesn't mean to be cruel, especially to our families (see <u>Small Catechism</u>: 1st & 4th Commandments, Table of Duties). In what ways can families become a false priority over daily faithfulness? *SC available* bookofconcord.org
- 4. Many people in our culture- even fellow Christians- say, "I would do anything for my family." Yet anything doesn't include going to worship, reading the Bible, & praying, etc. How does the story of Naaman help you choose the simple faithful things for your family? How does it help you encourage others to do the same? See 2 Kings 5:1-19

NEIGHBORS- Bearing fruit for those not yet our brothers & sisters

- 5. In a culture where Christians look & act nearly indistinguishably from non-Christians (including pornography & gossip/false witness) how do you tabulate the cost to be counted? (It often seems the greatest cost is being unliked & criticized for allegedly picayune morals.) What things must be renounced (*v33*) for discipleship? Build on #1, 3.
- 6. In *v32* Jesus is NOT promoting "compromise" (or defiance). Such "terms of peace" between kings were often financial, the weaker paying "tribute" to the stronger. What does St. Paul add in *Romans* 12:9--13:10, esp. 12:18, 13:8? How do Christians have more (or less) to give up for discipleship (*v33*) in our culture?
