

Dear Servant of Christ,

The empty tomb is a puzzle. When the women came upon it, all it did was to raise questions in their minds. What had happened? Who took the body? Why is it gone? When the two disciples who were making their way back home to Emmaus heard the story, all it did was create confusion in their minds. What could these women have seen? What could be this vision of angels they said they saw? What did they mean by saying, "Jesus is alive"? None of it made any sense to them. It was only when Jesus encountered them—the women at the tomb, the disciples on the road, or the apostles in the upper room—only then did they come to faith. Apart from the encounter with the risen Lord Jesus, everything was confusion and puzzlement.

Yet, our faith is not about puzzles and secrets. It is about a person—Christ Jesus—who died on an open hillside in the sight of hundreds . . . who was buried in a prominent place, in the tomb of a rich man . . . and who rose and appeared to hundreds more. None of this happened in a corner, out of sight. But it took place in the open, to be proclaimed to the whole world. Those who try to portray Jesus' resurrection as some wild story concocted in secret and foisted on a gullible world simply have not

taken the time to read the accounts of those who have borne witness to what they have heard and seen. Those who regard the resurrection as the figment of some fanatical group's imagination simply have not wrestled with the evidence presented in the lives and history of those who were willing to suffer and die for what they proclaimed as true: Jesus, who was dead, is alive!!!

As followers, ourselves, of this Risen One, it is our task, as well, to be witnesses to the resurrection in the world today. We are to be witnesses to what has been handed on to us. We are to be witnesses to the presence of Christ Jesus as we encounter Him today in our worship and fellowship. We are to be witnesses today as we live in the faith and confidence of our Lord in everything that we face in life. We are to be witnesses today by sharing the joy of the resurrection, by following our Lord's path of service and love.



Is the *Book of the Revelation* a mystery to you? Have you wished you could understand it? Perhaps you have hesitated to delve into it because you could not grasp the meaning of its strange language and symbols. The Revelation to John, the last book in the Bible, abounds with symbols: trumpets, scrolls, beasts, wings, plagues, white robes, and crowns. Can this book really speak to US?



Esther Onstad's book, "Courage for Today, Hope for Tomorrow," is an excellent Bible study on the Revelation. The author explains the symbolism that depicts the conflict between God and Satan and the victory of God's people. The focus of the Revelation is the **victorious Jesus Christ who vanquishes every enemy and who will bring a new heaven and a new earth**. Re-read that bold type again because that *IS* the bottom line for all believers.

We look at the world, we read the news, and shake our heads and become discouraged. So, what better way to begin a new year than with hope and courage . . . both of which are found only in a risen, ascended, victorious Savior.

Easter Images

WHITE is the color for Easter's joyous celebration.

BUTTERFLY - The butterfly, emerging from its tomb-like cocoon, symbolizes Christ emerging from His empty tomb.

CROWN - This refers to our Lord, crowned as the triumphant King of Kings and Lord of Lords. It also symbolizes the crown of eternal life that awaits all believers.

LILY - The flower, shaped like a bell of a trumpet, proclaims the victory of one who was dead but now lives.

ALLELUIA - This Hebrew word meaning "praise the Lord" is included in the grand victory celebrations in the book of Revelation.
