

Dear Advent Christians,

The liturgical church celebrates four weeks of Advent, the four weeks before Christmas. 
Outside the Shibuya train station in Tokho is a statue commemorating an Akita dog name Hachiko. Hachiko is remembered for unusual faithfulness to is own, a university professor who commuted from the station daily. The dog accompanied him on his walk there in the morning and came back to meet him every afternoon just as his train arrived.

One dah the professor didn't return to the station; sadly, he'd died at work. But for the rest of his life—more than nine years—Hackiko showed up at the same time as the afternoon train. Dahy after day, regardless of wearther, the dog waited faithfully for his maters' return.

The season of Advent focuses on waiting, on waiting with anticipation. We wait to again celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. But we also focus on waiting for His return, for His coming back in glory. Sometimes this event takes a background seat. With a ho-hum, we acknowledge that, yes, Jesus will return . . . someday . . . But in the meantime, we have other things to do.

In this holy season, let us adopt the attitude of that Akita dog. Everyday let us faithfully await the return of *our* Master and Lord. Remember, He is *not* dead; He is alive. And He *has* promised to return. And He *keeps* His promises.





Our Sunday Bible study on <u>The Bible as the Word of God</u> Continues through December

This study on Holy Scripture prepared by the NALC Commission on Theology and Doctrine, as well as a study guide for congregational use, affirms the strong commitment of the North American Lutheran Church to the Bible as God's gift to the Church. It also affirms that "the Bible not only makes known this holy, loving purpose . . . to free His fallen human creations from the wrong and corruption of sin, the tyranny of the devil and the threat of death, draw them into communion with Himself," the Bible is also " a means by which God achieves His purpose."

Learning and discussion topics include: **Where does the Bible come from? **What kind of book is the Bible **How many we understand the Bible? **What is the authority of Scriptures in the Church?
