The Five “Basic Food Groups” of Scripture

Dear Servants of the Christ,

Remember studying the basic food groups when you were in school? Can you still name them??? Fruits and vegetables; carbohydrates or starch; proteins; fats; dairy. I remember learning about these in science class. We were taught the importance of each group; we were taught the great variety in each group; having the right balance between the five groups was emphasized.



Recently I read an article that reviewed the five things we get from reading Scripture. As I read the article, it brought to mind the five basic food groups. As with the food, Scripture is important, in fact, it is vital. Scripture has great variety: people, places, events, miracles, parables, conflict, grace. And Scripture teaches that great balance between law and gospel. Let me share with you the “five basics” I learned from this article.



The **MESSAGE**: What is the LORD speaking to me? From the first chapter of Scripture to the final chapter, the Lord speaks to us. He tells us about the world, the world that He created. He explains how sin entered the world and the horrible resulting consequences. Most of the Old Testament (39 books) is about His plan to “fix” the deadly consequence of that sin by calling Abraham, building a nation, giving them land, giving them a future. And there is the wonderful message of God coming to earth Himself: John 3:16.

The **PROMISES**: What is/does the LORD promise? When we read Scripture, our heads literally spin with the promises from the Lord. His plan begins with a “biggie” to Abraham, recorded in Genesis 12: “I will bless you so that you can be a blessing



Or, how about that beauty from Isaiah 43:1, “I have called you by name, you are mine.” Or a favorite, “Lo, I am with you always.” And the promises end with that “almost-to-good-to-be-true” utterance from Revelation 21, “And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, for the former things are passed away.”

The **COMMAND**: What is the LORD telling me to do? Anyone can study about the five basic food groups, but the knowledge avails you nothing unless you act on what you learn (in other words, eat right!). The Lord loves us enough to proclaim His story to us, His message. He loves us enough to make and keep promises that only He can declare and keep. But He also loves us enough to tell us how to live. In fact, we even call His initial instructions “The Ten *Commandments*.” Jesus preached, He taught, and He commanded: forgive as you have been forgiven; love your neighbor as yourself; turn the other cheek; go the extra mile; let your light shine. You buy a new car or cell phone or appliance. Whatever you purchase comes with an instruction booklet which gives you “commands” to follow so you can make the new purchase work. The Lord wants our lives to “work,” hence, the commands.

The **WARNING**: What is the LORD cautioning me about? The moment we take our first step, we enter a world of “cautions and warnings.” From prescriptions to slippery sidewalks to maxing out a credit card . . . Be careful, be cautious, be aware. Misuse, ignoring instructions, reckless behavior can have negative, even dire, consequences. For me, personally, one of the most concise and vivid warnings found in Scripture is 1 Peter 5:8: “Be sober, be vigilant. Your adversary, the Devil, prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour.”



The Message is one of love and grace; the Promises comfort with God’s eternal presence; the Commands guide us in wise living; the Warnings daily challenge us to keep our focus on Christ.



The **APPLICATION**: How can I apply the LORD’s Word to my daily life? The Olympics ended last month. Think of any participant. At some point in his/her young life, they discovered an interest: in swimming, basketball, track, gymnastics. Doesn’t matter the field. But all Olympians have one thing in common: a daily (and I mean daily) regime of exercised, practice, diet, practice, mistakes, practice, aches and pains, practice. Day after day, week after week, month after month, year after year. So ask yourself the question: How do **I** apply the Lord’s Word to my daily life?

Daily Scripture, daily prayer, daily read, daily serve, daily read, stumble, fall, hurt, daily read, daily prayer . . . you get the idea. Olympians compete for the gold medal; Jesus has promised YOU the crown of life!

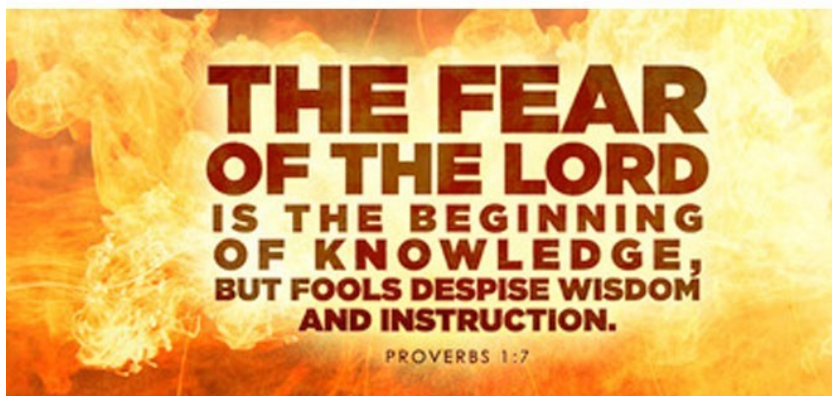
The NALC 2020 Vision: a 10-Point Plan
