Expenses for June 2023: \$18,503.17 Year to Date Expenses: \$80,638.59

Income for June: \$7,278.00 Year to Date Income: \$70,603.45

Our building has had some major repairs in the last couple of months. The roof had to be repaired in two places and we replaced one heat pump/ac unit in the sanctuary. As of the middle of July, two more heat pump/ac units were in need of repair/replacement and the furnace (central a/c) unit needed a costly repair.

It does look like a second heat pump will need to be replaced in the near future but in the long run it will be more efficient as one new unit will take the place of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ old units.

After worship service on August 6th, join us at the conference table in the office and we'll stuff the backpacks.


