

From the Pastor

New Opportunities at Tree of Life

In last month's *Leaflet*, I wrote how the Easter season is a celebration of new life. First and foremost, we celebrate the new and eternal life that Christ has given us through his death and resurrection. But we also celebrate the ongoing new life that God gives us and our congregation, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. What I didn't expect when writing that article was how quickly the Spirit would bring Tree of Life a couple exciting new opportunities for ministry!

First, we will be trying a new feeding ministry this month. A few weeks ago, our congregation's leadership learned that the Food Bank of Delaware operated a "Mobile Food Pantry," a truck that travels to different locations to distribute a month's supply of food for anyone in need. According to the Food Bank, "the truck comes filled with non-perishables, fresh produce, dairy, beverages and other refrigerated and frozen items, as well as personal products when available." The truck comes to a host site's parking lot, and any Delaware resident can drive up and receive a box of food at their car. All the food is provided by the Food Bank, in partnership with the USDA. A host site needs only to provide volunteers to help carry the food to cars, and to help spread the word about the truck. President John Baker has taken a lead in working with the Food Bank, and they seem excited about possibly working with Tree of Life. There are currently no locations for the Mobile Food Pantry in the MOT area, despite our region's growth. Tree of Life's parking lot is convenient and accessible, being next to U.S. 13 with two driveways. So at 11 a.m. Friday, May 12, the Mobile Food Pantry is scheduled to be at Tree of Life! We already have volunteers to help load the cars, but please help share the word! Our hope is that this can continue the legacy of our Grocery Club's feeding ministry, while tapping into another agency's resources to help alleviate some cost and labor. What an exciting new opportunity for our congregation to serve our community!

Second, we have a budding new relationship with St. Paul's Methodist Church in Odessa. The Rev. Linda Ray has been pastor at St. Paul's since last fall, and called our office a couple weeks ago to explore working together for Good Friday worship. She also invited us to their "open sanctuary" for silent prayer on Good Friday, and their Easter Egg Hunt that Saturday. Years ago, our congregations had a strong relationship, and as the two mainline churches in Odessa, it seems natural to rebuild those ties. I found our joint worship at



REVISING THE PRAYER LIST

To help control the length of our prayer list, Pr. Robbie and Council approved a new policy for removing names. Members, including the homebound and those in military service, will remain on the list until they ask to be removed. But starting Sunday, May 7, non-members will

SYNOD ASSEMBLY

The 2023 Delaware-Maryland Synod Assembly will take place June 9-10 in Westminster, Md. In addition to clergy, Tree of Life can send one man, one woman and anyone between confirmation and age 30. In you are interested, please talk to Council President John Baker or Pr. Robbie.

DEATH PENALTY BILL SUBMITTED IN DE LEGISLATURE

Representative Sean Lynn has introduced a bill in the State Legislature which would ban the use of the death penalty in Delaware.

The state does not currently have the death penalty because a few years ago the law which covered it was ruled unconstitutional by a judge. Following a case from Florida that had gone to the Supreme Court, the judge ruled that the Delaware law gave too much discretion to the judge and was thus not allowable.

Representative Lynn wants to make sure that the use of the death penalty will not come back to the state. His proposal requires life imprisonment without the possibility of parole for a person over eighteen years of age who is convicted of first-degree murder.

Lutherans are not necessarily pacifists, so we would not argue in principle that the state never has the power to take life. However, the Lutheran church has usually taken the position that state-sponsored violence (i.e. war, capital punishment) should be used rarely if at all.

The ELCA has a Social Statement (long-standing, adopted already in 1991) which says that "Capital punishment focuses on retribution, sometimes reflecting a spirit of vengeance...capital punishment makes no provable impact on the breeding grounds of violent crime...We would be a better society by joining the many nations that have already abolished capital punishment...we urge the abolishment of the death penalty."

The statement also makes the point that capital punishment is rarely used equitably. The rich, in murder trials, seldom face the death penalty; the poor often do.

Do you have an opinion about this bill? Your legislator would like to know.


