## The Pulpit and Pen



### Christmas or Xmas?

This month we celebrate Christmas, which is probably the favorite day of the year for most Americans regardless of whether or not they are Christians. Most people understand the significance of the day but choose to ignore it. That includes many Christians that give lip service to the day but then barely acknowledge God's role in the holiday as they become overwhelmed by the festivities of the day.

The celebration of Christmas on December 25 actually began due to numerous pagan holy days that were celebrated in Europe. Scandinavians celebrated Yule, a time of feasting, on the winter solstice. Germans honored the god Oden, who would fly over in winter and decide who would prosper during the following year. Romans celebrated Juvenalia and the birthday of the god Mithra on December 25. Even after being converted to Christianity, many Europeans continued their pagan celebrations on or near the winter solstice. Finally, in an effort to convince those former pagans to stop celebrating pagan holy days, Pope Julius I declared that Christians would celebrate the birth of Christ on December 25 instead of the birth of Mithra. It was a classic example of the attitude "if you can't beat them, join them."

Many of today's Christmas traditions have their origins in pagan celebrations. Santa Claus' annual flight had its origins in the German festival for the god Oden. The Christmas tree was introduced from an earlier tradition of celebrating the new crops that spring would soon bring.

The birth of Christ actually occurred during the Jewish Feast of Tabernacles, which was a celebration honoring the time that God led and tabernacled with His people. That festival would have occurred on or about what in our calendar is September 16.

However, in the early years of Christianity the exact date of Christ's birth was not viewed as important. Birthdays were not celebrated. The church viewed the dates of death as more important. That is why it is far easier today to calculate the dates of Jesus' death and resurrection than the date of His birth.

In the meantime, cultures change, and our modern society views birthdays as important days of celebration, especially that of Christ. It is not really critical that we celebrate the birth of Christ on the correct day, nor is it important that all the traditions associated with Christmas have their origins in scripture. What is important is that we give Christ the

position of preeminence in our worship and lives that He deserves and demands.

Today's modern Christmas celebration is a mix of Christianity and humanism. Nativity scenes, Christmas carols, and Bible stories remind us what we are celebrating. On the other hand, commercialism and spiritual neglect have tipped the scales of Christmas to being a purely humanistic, secular holiday.

As Christians we should never allow the busy commercialism of the season to overwhelm our focus on what Christmas is about. We celebrate God's having kept His promise by sending the Messiah. It really does not matter when Jesus was born. What matters is that He was indeed born. God became a man so He could reconcile the world to Himself.

I have encountered many Christians who criticize others for their use of the term Xmas instead of writing out the longer Christmas. However, if we allow ourselves to forget what Christmas is really about and get caught up in the secular commercialism that is so prevalent today, we will be guilty of doing in our hearts what others do with paper and pen. We will be celebrating Xmas instead of Christmas by stripping Christ of His rightful place in our hearts. Without Jesus, Christmas is just another secular holiday.

## Champions for Christ Kids


