### TERM 4, 2019

**Jacob** – My biography was quality because I was away for many of the sessions and missed some important teaching. I have worked hard to catch up and learn what I missed. I wrote about Brodie and I am finding it really fun learning about a friend. I am now up to publishing.

**Bethany** – I am proud of my biography because I have never written one before and I learnt how to write about a person in the classroom. I learnt about the information that needs to go into a biography and how to lay it out. I found the interview the trickiest part of the whole process.

**Kate R** – My quality work is the Excel spreadsheets I created in Maths. I created a theme park and had to do running costs, income and then a profit and loss statement. I learnt that Excel can be used for a range of things. I was getting frustrated because the computer kept losing my work but I was able to keep going with it and finally finished.

**Jasmine** – Creating an Excel Spreadsheet in maths is my quality work. I have never used Excel before and I learnt how to use formulas and merge cells for headings. I created a profit and loss statement for my theme park.

**Maya** – I am really proud of the spreadsheets that I created using Excel. I learnt how to use formulas to calculate sums of money and how to create new sheets. I applied this knowledge to my theme park project. I was really happy at the end when I got to print the spreadsheets out and see how much I had done.

**Kate P** – My quality work is my Novel Study. I have really enjoyed the reading part of it. I like the independence of novel studies and being able to manage my own learning. I think I have done this really well because I have been able to complete the tasks in the time and be prepared for the discussions.

**Harley** – My quality work this term is my Excel spreadsheets. I was impressed with the outcome, how it was laid out and how the formulas calculated all of my costs, income and profit. I have never created a profit and loss statement before and didn't know if I would be able to do it, so it was great when I finished it.

**Ollie** – My Excel spreadsheets in maths are my quality work. I have learnt how to use Excel, how to use formulas like auto sum to calculate costs and I am now able to find out my monthly profit and loss and what my running costs are for my theme park.

**Lily** – I am really proud of my theme park maths. I learnt how to do Excel spreadsheets, work out how much the daily running costs are for my theme park, how much money I made each day and what my profit was. It was easy to use the formulas to work out the costs.

**Alana** – My Rotary Award is my quality work. When doing the activities, I discovered new things, was game enough to experience things out of my comfort zone and help out the community. I worked really hard and didn't think I would get there but when I did it felt really good.

**Sarah** – My quality work is going to Regional cricket. I learnt how to field better and bowl more accurately. I am proud that we won a game on the day.

**Tully** – This term my quality work is the biography I wrote about Zeb. I learnt a lot about Zeb and about writing biographies. I learnt how to insert quotes and how to conduct an interview. I am really proud of my work as I have never written a biography before and I think it is good.

**Jessica** – I am really proud of my effort at cricket. Our team made it to Regionals and when I was bowling I stumped 2 people and caught 1 person. I got all three wickets in 1 game.

## CFA doorknocking in Eagle Point and Banksia Peninsula area this weekend

Local CFA crews will be doorknocking in Eagle Point and Banksia Peninsula conducting *Property Advice Visit Service* (PAVS) this weekend 23<sup>rd</sup>-24<sup>th</sup> November.

PAVS are conducted to provide personalised, tailored advice by your local CFA Brigade members and CFA personnel.

CFA District 11 Operations Manager Daryl Hunter said to not be concerned if CFA is knocking on your door.

"We will be doorknocking more than 100 houses in the area.

"If we are at your house, you live in a high bushfire risk zones, CFA is there to provide you one-on-one individual advice on how to reduce the risk of fire on your property and help develop your plan if bushfires come."

Mr Hunter emphasised however that the ultimate responsibility is on you.

"While we can provide advice, we need people to know that they need to be proactive about reducing fire risk on their properties.

"The advice is the same all year round, have your fire plan ready and prepare your property."

With an above average fire season predicted now is the time to be preparing for the fire season and it may be helped by a visit from CFA.




