

The Just Word

8 November. Harvester Judgement:

The Harvester Judgement was a landmark legal case in the campaign for a fair basic wage for Australian workers. The case had both national and international significance.

The Harvester Judgement was delivered in the Australian Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration by HB Higgins. The case involved the Sunshine Harvester Works, a company owned by Hugh Victor McKay that built agricultural machinery. Higgins ruled that McKay was obliged to pay its employees a wage that guaranteed them a standard of living which was

reasonable for 'a human being in a civilised community', regardless of its capacity to pay. This gave rise to the legal requirement for a basic wage, which dominated Australian economic life for the next 60 to 80 years.

The hearing took place in Melbourne from 7 October 1907 to 8 November 1907. Higgins heard evidence from employees of McKay's factory and also their wives. In defining a 'fair and reasonable wage', Higgins referred to Pope Leo XIII's 1891 encyclical *Rerum Novarum* which addressed the condition of the working classes. Higgins ruled that remuneration 'must be

enough to support the wage earner in reasonable and frugal comfort.'

Higgins set a 'fair and reasonable' minimum wage for unskilled workers of 7 shillings, which is around 70 cents, or 42 shillings per week.

McKay successfully appealed the decision to the High Court. Notwithstanding that, the 1907 Harvester decision was regarded as a benchmark in Australian industrial case law. Higgins regarded the minimum wage as sacrosanct and applied the Harvester reasoning to subsequent judgements in his long and distinguished career as president of the Conciliation and Arbitration Court.

Titles and Burdens

I have known our Archbishop Emeritus for many, many years. Every time I speak to him, I preface the remark with, 'Your Grace', a feudal title straight out of the Middle Ages. I am so brainwashed that nothing else seems quite right. But Our Lord, I am sure, would not approve.

This Gospel also makes me query the common title given to Catholic Priests: 'Father'. I am so used to the term, that I don't think of it as overloaded with meaning. It is just a greeting. It is true that St Paul described himself as a father to the community of faith at Corinth (1 Cor 4:15). But, nevertheless.

When I was Parish Priest at Bridgewater I often celebrated Mass at Pontville. You can see the two French words, pont = bridge, and ville = village. One of the ancient titles of the Pope is 'Pontiff' from the ancient Roman title 'Pontifex Maximus' which means 'the greatest bridge-builder', building the bridge between heaven and earth. I don't think Our Lord would approve of that.

When Pope John Paul II visited St Canice Church in our Parish, a plaque was unveiled which simply titles him, 'Bishop of Rome, Servant of the servants of God'. That is certainly in line with today's Gospel.

We have to be careful with ecclesiastical titles. They can go with a mindset which is dangerous for church leadership. Jesus spoke of it in relation to some Jewish authorities of his time, but of course it applies with special force to Christian leaders. They tie up heavy burdens and lay them on men's shoulders, but will they lift their finger to move them? Not they! But they do love to be greeted obsequiously!

There have been periods in the church's history, where the burdens placed on the shoulders of people — particularly an exaggerated sense of guilt for certain sins — truly weighed people down, creating a terrible sense of unworthiness, leading to the living of a distorted life.

But these days, when people feel that the Church is laying an unsupportable burden, perhaps on their relationship with another, they throw off the burden and move away from the institutional Church.

The Church withers and dies that little more because we lose the presence of good people.

Nevertheless, there are boundaries and limits which give a social group its identity. The Church has its identity founded in the Gospels. In it we find the One who said: 'My yoke is easy and my burden light.'

Of course, a yoke over an animal shows it is harnessed for work and gives it direction. No-one says being a Christian is aimless and requires no effort, but the test for whether the yoke imposed by Church authorities is fashioned from the wood of the Gospel is clear.

'Come to me all you who toil and are burdened *and I will refresh you*. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me for I am meek and humble in heart *and you will find rest for your souls*. For my yoke is easy and my burden light.' (Matt 11:28-30)

If people don't find that the burden laid on them by Church leaders leads to refreshment and rest for their souls, then it is right to question the burden, and to question the leaders who impose such burdens.

Our Lord makes it clear that leaders cannot evade the question by hiding behind honorific titles. Perhaps we will be more likely to get it right by only using the title favoured by modern Popes: 'Servant of the servants of God'. I am sure our Lord would approve of that.

Since Vatican II the responsibilities of leadership have been spread throughout the community. This has not happened simply because there are fewer priests and religious. It has occurred primarily because the Council itself insisted that by virtue of their baptism all Christians are called to discipleship, which includes active participation in the mission of the church. While those who are ordained continue in specialised forms of leadership, other people have stepped forward to assume their newly recognised responsibilities. Sometimes they have more influence in the church than do the ordained.

We derive the connection between pharisaical and hypocritical from Jesus' description of the Pharisees found in today's reading. His condemnation, along with the condemnation of the priests in the first reading, should be a warning to all who in any way exercise leadership. We must always be on our guard lest the trappings of leadership ensnare us and we fail in our responsibilities toward God and the community we serve.

There is a mode of leadership that reflects the very meaning of authority. This way of leadership authors life. It is characterised by the striking image of a nursing mother who both gives and sustains life. Those who exercise leadership in this way create a community where life is fostered, not stifled, where talents serve all of the members, and the talents of all of the members are invited to serve. Such a community not only nurtures its members, it is itself the author of life in the world.



"The greatest among you will be the one who serves the rest," Jesus says in today's Gospel.



Proposed legislation to legalise assisted suicide and euthanasia will be debated in the Parliament of New South Wales on the 16 November. Similar bills are expected to be introduced in other states in the near future.
