## Parallel Truths

In ancient Jewish theology, there were various names for diabolical evil. 'Satan' was amongst them. Satan was the adversary of humankind. In particular, Satan was a prosecutor appearing before the throne of God accusing human beings of their offences and demanding retribution, that the punishment fit the crime.

On the contrary, our Lord had a very different image of himself in relating to us, the opposite of the satanic prosecutor. Did you notice in today's Gospel, knowing he was departing from his followers, he says: 'I will send you another *Paraclete* to be with you forever.' Our Lord was a *Paraclete*, and he would send *another*.

What does this strange sounding word mean? Here is a hint. We all know that parallel lines run, well, para-llel. They run alongside each other.

A *paraclete* is a person who stands alongside someone and uses his voice on their behalf. A *paraclete* is a person who stands shoulder to shoulder with someone and pleads their case.

That is how our Lord Jesus Christ saw himself in relation to his disciples. His role was not to condemn but to plead the case for mercy and compassion, to be the intercessor par excellence, to be the best character witness one might ever hope to have.

We see our Lord in this role with the woman taken in adultery. He saves her from death by stoning, engages her in conversation and, most importantly, refuses to condemn her.

But, our Lord's visible earthly mission was coming to an end. Hence he made a promise. That another *Paraclete*, another

advocate, would be sent to dwell in the body of the disciples.

This is a most fantastic gift. Dwelling within us, individually and as the body of Christ's disciples, is the Holy Spirit advocating our cause, giving voice to our deepest aspirations.

This *Paraclete* particularly assists us by acting as the Spirit of Truth, always reminding us of the reality about our Lord Jesus Christ. For us, that includes trying to live according to the pattern revealed in His ministry, and that will have its challenges, its failures, its successes and its doubts.

And one of the challenges is to check on our tendency to condemn. Discernment is necessary. I lecture at the Law School on crimes against humanity and genocide. Obviously, one has to condemn those who perpetrate these atrocities which violate our common humanity.

But Pope Francis has indicated that the Church needs to move away from strident moralistic hectoring in a condemnatory tone.

In a recent interview he said:

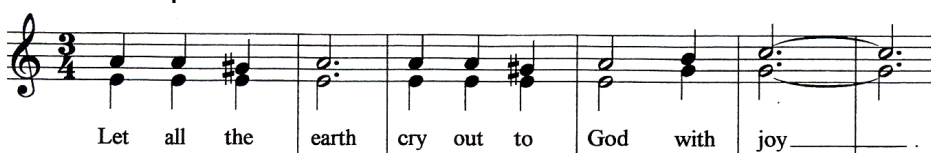
'In Buenos Aires I used to receive letters from homosexuals persons who are "socially wounded". They tell me that they feel like the Church has always condemned them ...

'A person once asked me, in a provocative manner, if I approved of homosexuality. I replied with another question: Tell me: when God looks at a gay person, does he endorse the existence of that person with love, or reject and condemn that person?'

## Social Justice

### 50th Anniversary of the 1967 Referendum 27 May:

At the 1967 referendum more than 90 per cent of Australian electors voted to change the constitution to permit the Federal Parliament to make laws for Aboriginal people and to allow them to be included in the national census.

While the 1967 referendum was a watershed moment in Australian history and was well-intentioned, the resulting amendments left the Constitution with no mention whatsoever of Aboriginal or

Torres Strait Islander people and with clauses that allow discrimination on the basis of race.

After the 2010 election the Federal Government made a commitment to hold a referendum to make changes to the Constitution to remedy these problems. An Expert Panel was appointed in 2011 to consult and make recommendations for changing the Constitution.

In its final report, the panel suggests that the main issues that need to be addressed are:

1. Placing a statement of recognition somewhere in the Constitution.

2. Removing section 25, which currently would allow state governments to disqualify a group of people from voting based on race.

3. Reformulating the race power (section 51 (xxvi)) to avoid the potential for negative outcomes while retaining the Commonwealth's responsibility for Indigenous affairs. More Information:

# Scripture Readings

Bruce Janiga

## 6th Sunday of Easter, May 21

Acts 8:5–8, 14–17  
Ps 65:1–7, 16, 20 R. see v. 1  
1 Pt 3:15–18  
Jn 14:15–21

In the Gospel today Jesus continues to speak to the disciples at the Last Supper. Knowing that he is about to leave them, he promises, “I will not leave you orphans” (v 18), pledging the gift of the Holy Spirit “to be with you always” (v 16). Jesus’ death and resurrection are part of God’s plan and will lead to a deeper union between Jesus and his followers. The gift of “another Advocate” (v 2) assures us of his never-ending presence.

Ironically, the persecution of the church leads to its growth. In Acts, after Stephen’s death, Philip, another deacon, goes to “Samaria ... [proclaiming] the Christ to them” (v 5). That he is empowered by the Spirit is indicated by the fact that he speaks with power. “The crowds paid attention to what was said” (v 6), and he performs miracles, exorcising demons and healing those who are paralysed or crippled. He is doing the work of Jesus (see Jn 14:12). This evangelisation leads to a visit from Peter and John, who “prayed for them” (v 15) and “laid hands on them,” as a result of which “they received the Holy Spirit” (v 17).

Peter writes with an awareness that believers will suffer for their faith. But this should not discourage us, “for Christ also suffered” (v 18). We are called to be examples of integrity, practicing “gentleness and reverence” (v 16), even in our dealings with those who persecute us. We are also called to be a people of hope, because Christ’s suffering has a uniqueness about it that leads us to God. Christ’s suffering unites us to God in a way that our suffering alone could never achieve. He died, “the righteous for the sake of the unrighteous” (v 18).

*For reflection:* Do I see value in suffering in my life? In the lives of others? How do I experience the presence of the Spirit in the church?

## Ascension of the Lord, May 28

Acts 1:1–11  
Ps 46:2–3, 6–9 R. v. 6  
Eph 1:17–23  
Mt 28:16–20

Luke begins Acts by referring to his “first book” (v 1), the Gospel, and summing up the final days of the risen Christ on earth. Then he narrates the story of Jesus’ ascension. For Luke the ascension is the bridge between the story of the earthly Jesus and the ongoing story of the church, which is an open-ended story in which we are called to play our parts. To assist the church in its task, Jesus promises “power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you”; this power will transform the disciples, enabling them to preach the gospel “throughout Judea and Samaria, / and to the ends of the earth” (v 8).

In the verse preceding today’s second reading, Paul gives thanks for the Ephesians (see v 16), a standard feature in Greco-Roman letters. He prays that they may gain knowledge of God, leading to “the hope that belongs to [God’s] call” (v 18). Our hope is based in Christ, who after his resurrection took his seat at the right hand of the Father in heaven. This is a place of honor, signifying that he is “far above every principality, authority, power, and dominion” (v 21). As “head over all things” (v 22), Christ is head of the church, and we are united to him.

In Matthew’s final scene, Jesus meets the disciples in Galilee. This is where he first met them and where much of his public ministry took place before he journeyed to Jerusalem in Judea to die. Jesus tells them that he has been given “all power in heaven and on earth” (v 18), and he commissions them to “go ... make disciples” (v 19). They are to do this by teaching “all that I have commanded you” (v 20) and “baptising them” (v 19). Matthew concludes by having Jesus promise, “I am with you always” (v 20), reinforcing his identity as Emmanuel, a name Matthew associated with Jesus in his first chapter (see 1:23).

*For reflection:* Does my prayer include thanksgiving for others? Do I have a sense of sharing in the commission of the disciples?



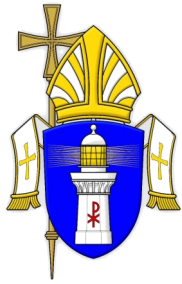
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Those who obey the commandments, Jesus says in today’s Gospel, are the ones who really love Him. Does my stewardship reveal my love for Jesus?

The Pope answers of course that God accompanies that person with love and mercy.

Adopting this approach, with discernment, we will find a deep peace, the sort of peace the world cannot give. It is a deep down assurance that we are on the right track, that we are living our lives Truth-fully by the measure of the One who is the Way, the Truth and the Life.

In another Gospel, it is said that Jesus had a mystical experience in which he saw Satan falling from heaven (Luke 10:18). That is, Satan the prosecutor is no longer standing before God accusing human beings of various faults and felonies, seeking their punishment.

The one standing before God is Our Risen Lord. He stands before the Father as the 'Paraclete', pleading our case, acting as our character witness.

And here on our earthly pilgrimage, the Holy Spirit of Truth is walking alongside us as the 'other Paraclete', shoulder to shoulder, helping us to combat Satan who still roams the earth.

This revelation of the fall of Satan from Heaven, and the assistance of the divine Paracletes, is the cause of our Peace, a peace the world cannot give, the Peace which is our Lord's Easter gift to us.

Alleluia!
