The Spirit casts out fear

Today's feast, as we know, fulfils a number of functions. It marks the end of Christmastide; it looks forward to Lent, inasmuch as the gospel of the First Sunday of Lent is about the temptation of Christ, the next event after his baptism; and it introduces us to the principal theme of Ordinary Time, Jesus' proclamation of the Kingdom of God.

The gospel readings this year come from Mark, and Mark gives the briefest version of Jesus' baptism. Yet, like the other evangelists, he makes the point that the Spirit does not merely come down on Jesus as he did on kings, prophets and priests in the Old Testament, and as he comes down on all God's children in the New—he comes down on Jesus in such a way as to empower him to "baptise with the Holy Spirit." (John makes this point by saying that the Spirit comes down on Jesus and rests on him.)

Saint Irenaeus (Father of the Church, 2nd century) describes the relationship between Jesus and the Spirit as being "the two hands of God." You can see what he means from today's story: Jesus is controlled by the Spirit, and yet (at the same time) he gives the Spirit (or "baptises with" the Spirit).

It is in this Spirit that Jesus faces the future: not only the years of evangelisation, but also the passion and death that will give his gospel its substance and force. He faces that future without fear. And so should we. As John says in the second reading, 'Who can overcome the world? Only the man who believes that Jesus is the Son of God: Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood; with the Spirit as another witness.'

There are said to be 365 occurrences in the Bible, of the phrase, 'Do not be afraid.' Evidently we need to be reminded frequently of our tendency to fear. Fear should not take up the space meant for love: "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love" (1 Jn 4:18).

So our song today, as we think of Jesus' baptism and ours, is: "Truly, God is my salvation, I trust, I shall not fear. For the Lord is my strength, my song, he became my saviour. With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation."

Social Justice

A Crown for Australia:

Sport is a noble thing. It introduces us to people who become life-long friends. It gives us permission to be tribal, but without guns or death or misery—though losing can be rather unpleasant. It lets us know that life doesn't revolve around 'me'. Worthwhile achievements require others as well: we are not alone; I am with others in good times and in bad. Sport builds perseverance and resilience: hard work, success and failure, honour and humiliation are constant variables in sport.

It is rare that fickleness and laziness meet success, so sport

can be a wise taskmaster and often a hard one. It tells us clearly: short cuts won't do; you've got to earn it; and 'there's more in you than you realise—take a risk'.

At its best, sport offers a safe and nurturing space where rich and poor, men and women, people of all colours and creeds can meet with a common goal; a place where human dignity is more important than winning the game.

Sport is a national obsession. At work, after church, on the bus or the train, in the street, the same questions bring people together: 'How's the cricket? The golf? The footy? The ten-

nis?'

We like to think that sport reflects the best in us, but if it does, we have to admit that it can also reflect the worst in us. It can be like a crown of thorns. Sometimes it shows things that make us ashamed. As Pope Paul II said in an address to athletes in 2000:

It can be a vehicle of high human and spiritual ideals when it is practised with full respect for its rules; but it can also fail in its true aim when it leaves room for other interests that ignore the centrality of the human person.



Awakening our memory of Baptism

I was baptised the same day I was born, so it's easy to remember the date. Born earlier than expected, I was very small. My father likes to say that at three-and-a-half pounds, I wasn't even as big as a good-sized chicken. About 50 years ago, the prognosis for such an infant was not as positive as it is today. In an abundance of caution, I was baptised within moments of being born, by a nurse in the delivery room.

My father's experience with baptism was quite different. He was old enough to remember being baptised in a country Baptist church. The minister had told him to hold his breath, which he started doing as soon as the preacher started speaking. By the time he was immersed in the water, he was just about out of air, so his baptism was nearly a drowning!

Even if most baptisms aren't particularly memorable, the sacrament is a fundamental, pivotal point in the spiritual journey. It marks the moment when we are welcomed into the community of believers, and by the love of Christ, our lives are transformed.

Pope Francis has intense insight about the memory of baptism:

We must reawaken the memory of our Baptism. We are called to live out our Baptism every day as the present reality of our lives. If we manage to follow Jesus and to remain in the Church, despite our limitations and with our weaknesses and our sins, it is precisely in the Sacrament whereby we have become new creatures and have been clothed in Christ. It is by the power of Baptism, in fact, that, freed of original sin, we are inserted into Jesus' relation to God the Father; that we are bearers of a new hope, for Baptism gives us this new hope: the hope of going on the path of salvation our whole life long. And this hope nothing and no one can extinguish, for it is a hope that does not disappoint. Remember, hope in the Lord never disappoints. Thanks to Baptism, we are capable of forgiving and of loving even those who offend us and do evil to us. By our Baptism, we recognise in the least and in the poor the face of the Lord who visits us and makes himself close. Baptism helps us to recognise in the face of the needy, the suffering, and

also of our neighbour, the face of Jesus. All this is possible thanks to the power of Baptism! (General Audience [Jan. 8, 2014], 2; See link)

When we baptise infants, and sometimes adults, we ask questions (see *Rite of Baptism*, 76). At the Easter Vigil and on other occasions, we renew our baptismal promises in a question-and-answer format (see *Roman Missal*, Easter Vigil, 55). These questions offer an opportunity to explore and reflect on the grace and new hope of following Jesus. As we approach the feast of Baptism of the Lord, such reflection can lead us to awaken the memory of our baptisms.

What name do you give ...?

- What do we name ourselves? How do others name us? "Who do you say I am?"
- How often is that name Christian? Or minister of God's people? Servant?
- What is the name God calls you? Beloved? Chosen? Stranger?


What do you ask of God's Church ...?

- As we grow in the life of the church, do we seek to be immersed in the fire of the Spirit, to be engulfed in living water, and to be renewed in our unity with the community of believers in Jesus Christ?
- Is our ministry a visible extension of the promises we make in baptism?

Do you renounce sin, so as to live in the freedom of the children of God?

Do we choose to reject sin and dedicate ourselves to the rejection of sin in the world? By this we form the basis of our social conscience. We are called in baptism to be living examples of the freedom promised us when we commit willingly to lives worthy of that call.

Do you believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth?

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins,

the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

Do we commit our heart, mind, and soul to the faith of the church?

We serve in ministry by virtue of our baptism, where the love of God flows from the font that gives us life in Christ. That love, grace, and strength is the memory we are challenged to awaken. **ML**
