## **ORDINARY TIME**

# Lent begins Wednesday

Lent begins this Wednesday. *Ash Wednesday Masses* will be celebrated at 7.45 a.m., 10.00 a.m. (with the Parish School) and 7.30 p.m.

Ash Wednesday is also a day of *fast and* abstinence.

There are now only two days in Australia on which we are obliged to fast and abstain: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting is about *how much* we eat and drink; abstinence is about *what* we eat and drink.

The only penitential abstinence required of us these days is from meat.

Fasting now entails only that we have no more than one full meal and two lighter meals.

Everyone over the age of fourteen is bound to abstain from flesh meat.

Everyone between the ages of 18 and 59 is bound to fast.

Whether one is younger or older than these groups, there is still the general obligation to do penance during Lent.

Every Friday throughout the year is a day of penance, and the whole of Lent is a season of penance. This makes the Fridays of Lent of particular significance.

We have the custom here of making the *Stations of the Cross* on the Fridays of Lent. We start this Friday, at 7.30 p.m.

There will also be Stations on Wednesdays at 4 p.m., starting on Ash Wednesday.

Because Lent is a penitential season, Catholics have long had the habit of attending daily Mass during Lent. Daily Mass here is at a convenient time, and everyone is encouraged to attend.

The Blessed Sacrament chapel is open before and after services and during office hours. *Visiting the Blessed Sacrament* is highly recommended at any time of the year, but it is especially appropriate during Lent.

Another traditional Lenten exercise is *spiritual reading*. You will find a good range of suitable material in the CTS pamphlet rack near the main doors of the church.

What I have mentioned so far falls into two of the three traditional categories of Lenten observance: prayer and fasting. The third is *almsgiving*, and our way of observing that is *Project Compassion*. Boxes and sets of envelopes for Project Compassion are available on the table in the gathering area as you leave the worship space. Let us use them generously. After all, what we save through self-denial in Lent does not go into our bank account: it goes to the poor.

Bike will benefit Homeless:

Paris: A Harley-Davidson motorbike that briefly belonged to Pope Francis has been sold for €241,500 (\$369,000), 16 times its highest valuation at an auction in Paris.

The US motorbike maker gave the 1585cc Dyna Super Glide to the Pope in June to mark its 110th anniversary and while the 77 year old never rode it, he signed it to Catholic charity Caritas Roma.

It's a record for a post-vintage motorbike, from the 21st century," said Bonhams France, adding the bike was purchased by an unidentified European Buyer. The funds from the sale will go towards the restoration of the charity's hostel and soup kitchen, based at Rome's Termini railway station.

Bonhams said Pope Francis has another Harley-Davidson, although the famously humble pontiff is more a fan of buses. Canberra Times February, 2014.

# **Scripture Readings**

Bruce Janiga

### 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time, March 2

Is 49:14–15 Ps 62:2–3, 6–7, 8–9 1 Cor 4:1–5 Mt 6:24–34

Today's text from Isaiah is addressed to the exiles. Their experience has led some of them to believe that God has abandoned them: "The Lord has forsaken me" (v 14). Half a century in exile has broken their spirit, but the prophet tells us that God never forgets. In a tender image, Isaiah speaks for God, "Can a mother forget her infant?"; the thought was unimaginable to our prophet, but "even should she forget, / I will never forget you" (v 15). God's love for us is greater than we can imagine. In the next verse after our reading, the Lord says, "Upon the palms of my hands I have engraved you" (v 16).

Paul cautions the Corinthians against judging each other. He reminds them that at "the appointed time" (v 5), we will be judged by God. His task as Christ's servant requires fidelity to the gospel, and he believes that nothing can be held against him. Judgment will occur when the Lord comes, bringing "to light what is hidden in darkness" (v 5). As "stewards of the mysteries of God" (v 1) like Paul, we too are called to fulfill our tasks with clear consciences as we await his coming. Instead of judging others, we should focus on living our own faith worthily.

In the Gospel today Jesus calls us to trust God. We spend too much time worrying about things we cannot change, and that worry cannot "add a single moment to [our] life-span" (v 27). Using the examples of nature around him, Jesus explains that God cares for "the birds in the sky" (v 26) and "the grass of the field" (v 30). If God provides for them, then he will also provide for us, who are "more important than they" (v 26). Our focus should be to seek "the kingdom of God and his righteousness" (v 33).

For reflection: How can experiencing God's absence make me appreciate God's presence in my life? How can I learn to worry less and trust God more?

### Ash Wednesday, March 5

JI 2:12–18 Ps 51:3–4, 5–6, 12–13, 14, 17 2 Cor 5:20–6:2 Mt 6:1–6, 16–18

The season of Lent is an invitation to holiness. On Ash Wednesday we mark ourselves with ashes made from the palms used last Palm Sunday. These ashes are a biblical symbol of contrition, but they also remind us of our own mortality.

The words of the prophet Joel, from the fifth century BC, address a complacent people. In the verses prior to our reading, Joel calls them to prepare for the "day of the Lord" that will bring great destruction. Yet even with destruction imminent, there is cause for hope, for the "gracious and merciful" Lord forgives the repentant sinner (v 13). Joel calls for a national act of repentance: "Blow the trumpet in Zion! / proclaim a fast, call an assembly" (v 15). Everyone — "the elders ... the children ... the infants ... the bridegroom ... the bride ... the priests" — is called to cry out for forgiveness. And in response to their cries, the Lord "took pity on his people" (v 18).

Paul writes as an ambassador for Christ, imploring the Corinthians to "be reconciled to God" (5:20). Through Christ's death, we have been reconciled to God; therefore, we should not "receive the grace of God in vain" (6:1) but live with the awareness that we are "a new creation" (as mentioned prior to our reading in 5:17). "Now is the day of salvation" (6:2); let us walk in God's light.

In the Gospel Jesus warns about doing the right thing for the wrong reason. Piety and sanctity are not the same thing. Our good deeds should not be performed "in order that people may see them" (v 1). Nor should our prayers be said to impress others. And when we fast we should not make a show of it. Our actions should be motivated by our love of God and a desire to reject sin and embrace the holiness to which we are called.

For reflection: The road to holiness is a lifelong journey; what particular area am I determined to focus on this Lent? When I pray, is there a healthy balance between speaking to God and listening for a response?



Stewards of the mysteries of God—that's what St. Paul says we are in today's second reading. And the first requirement, he says, is that we be trustworthy. Entrusted with the gift of faith, do I share it as gratefully and as generously as I do my time,my talent, and my treasure?

# **Chair of Peter**

The only piece of furniture with a feast day on the Catholic calendar, the chair of Peter is honoured each year on February 22. The chair is largely symbolic. It is a way of speaking of the authority of the one who uses it. A cathedral carries that name because it is named for the bishop's chair, the *cathedra*. A pope speaks *ex cathedra* – "from the chair" — when he gives official pronouncements. We use a similar expression when we say a judge speaks "from the bench." The furniture represents the authority of the one who speaks from it.

The day honours the tradition that Peter became the bishop of Antioch on this day before becoming bishop of Rome, an event that was formerly honoured on January 18. In fact, January 18–25 became the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity because those dates bridge the days assigned to two great Christian biblical leaders: the chair of Peter and the conversion of Paul. Revisions to the calendar combined the two feasts of Peter, and the more ancient of the two, February 22, remained.

It is doubtful that Peter actually sat in a designated chair to rule the Christians of Rome, and even more doubtful that that chair has been preserved. However, in the ninth century, Charles the Bald gave what some believed to be Peter's chair to the Vatican. It is enshrined against the back wall of the basilica beneath the alabaster image of the Holy Spirit, inside a reliquary designed by Gianlorenzo Bernini above what is appropriately called the altar of the chair.

The collect for the day acknowledges the confession of faith made by Peter, upon whom Christ built the church. His successors, the popes, occupy his "chair" and speak with his authority.
