# The Voice

Today is traditionally called Gaudete Sunday. Over the first millennium of Christianity Advent was like a late Lent. Both were five weeks long, both were marked by fasting and penance and both gave the faithful a day off half way through. In Lent Laudete Sunday is still, roughly, half way through the five-week season. Advent, however, was shortened to four weeks in the tenth century, and Pope St Gregory the Great eased the fasting and penitential aspects of this season in the twelfth century, but the not-so-half-way Gaudete Sunday has remained. It is, literally, the 'rejoicing' Sunday when we look more directly at Jesus' coming at Christmas.

To enable us to look at Jesus we start with the man who heralded his mission in the world, John the Baptist. In today's Gospel John the Baptist is the model of humility, opening the way for the Kingdom of Jesus to break in upon the world. We should never underestimate talent spotters, for as this story demonstrates, they all have John the Baptist as their patron saint.

Fleming was a poor Scottish farmer in the nineteenth century. One day, while trying to make a living for his family, he heard a cry for help coming from a nearby bog. He dropped his tools and ran to the bog. There, mired to his waist in black muck, was a terrified boy, screaming and struggling to free himself. Farmer Fleming saved the lad from what could have been a slow and terrifying death.

The next day, a fancy carriage pulled up to the Scotsman's sparse cottage. An elegantly dressed nobleman stepped out and introduced himself as the father of the boy Farmer Fleming had saved. 'I want to repay you,' said the nobleman. 'You saved my son's life.' 'No, I can't accept payment for what I did,' the Scot-

tish farmer replied, waving away the offer.

At that moment, the farmer's own son came to the door of the family home. 'Is that your son?' the nobleman asked. 'Yes,' the farmer replied proudly. 'I'll make you a deal. Let me take him and give him a good education. If the lad is anything like his father, he'll grow up to be a man you can be proud of.' And that is what he did.

In time, Farmer Fleming's son graduated from St Mary's Medical School in London, and went on to become known throughout the world as the noted Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of Penicillin. Years afterward, the nobleman's son was stricken with pneumonia. What saved him? Penicillin.

The nobleman's name? Randolph Churchill. His son's name? Sir Winston Churchill

John the Baptist, the embodiment of the old covenant, recognises who Jesus is for the world and encourages his foes and friends alike to welcome in the Christ, the new and everlasting Covenant. Just like Farmer Fleming or Lord Randolph Churchill, he could not have known the implications of what he was doing. John the Baptist simply saw Jesus and knew that Love had taken human form. Through his talent spotting and in his promotion of Jesus he enabled the first generation of Christians to see and believe that the promises made to their ancestors had been fulfilled.

No wonder we have him as our focus on *Gaudete* Sunday. And so may we all rejoice today, not only because salvation is always close at hand in Christ the Lord, but because we are also called to spot his love in every act of goodness we see, encourage and promote it as best we can and then watch nature and grace do the rest.

## The Just Word

Timor Sea treaty at last:

Timor-Leste and Australia have finally agreed on a draft treaty to establish a new maritime boundary in the Timor Sea and set up talks leading to an early decision on the utilisation of the Greater Sunrise seabed gas resource.

The agreement, reached after negotiations at the Conciliation Commission in The Hague in October, follows years of often acrimonious dispute over the boundaries—originally agreed between Australia and Indonesia—and access to the gas fields.

The draft treaty delimits the maritime boundary between

the two countries in the Timor Sea and addresses the legal status of the Greater Sunrise gas field, the establishment of a Special Regime for Greater Sunrise, a pathway to the development of the resource, and the sharing of the resulting revenue. Timor-Leste and Australia will now pursue their domestic approval processes before signing the treaty and the specifics of the boundaries will be released after further talks between the parties. Representatives of the

Representatives of the Greater Sunrise Joint Venture joined the negotiations and the agreement provides for

the Hague Commission to remain involved to facilitate talks between the two countries and the joint venture to ensure there is an informed decision on the development of the Greater Sunrise field.

The Commission hopes the treaty can be signed by the end of this year or early 2018 if talks proceed as planned.

## Scripture Readings

#### 3rd Sunday of Advent, December 17

Is 61:1-2, 10-11 Lk 1:46-50, 53-54 1 Thess 5:16-24 Jn 1:6-8, 19-28

Once again we encounter John the Baptist in today's Gospel. He "came to testify to the light" (v 7), who is the one promised by God long ago through the prophets. John's presence and preaching stir up the hopes of the people. They suspect he might be "the Christ or Elijah or the Prophet" (v 25), individuals expected to be sent by God to the people. But John tells them, and us, that the one coming "after me" (v 27) is more than that. The one who is to come is the Son of God, our redeemer.

Today's text from Third Isaiah is considered a foreshadowing of the mission of Jesus. "The spirit of the Lord God is upon me" (v 1). He has been anointed and sent. He comes to bring "glad tidings" (v 1), the gospel, to those in darkness. The time of his visitation marks a new era in world history, a time when those who are in need of God's healing grace will receive it and when justice will "spring up" (v 11) on the earth.

Paul calls the Thessalonians to persevere in their faith. "Pray without ceasing" (v 17), he advises. In his prayer for them he prays that God will "make you perfectly holy / and may you ... / be preserved blameless for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (v 23). God is faithful, Paul tells us, and "he will also accomplish it" (v 24). Writing with an expectation of an imminent return of the Lord Jesus, Paul exhorts them to live lives of holiness as they wait. Two thousand years later, we still anticipate his return and so are called to live with that same hope, cooperating with the grace of God in our lives.

For reflection: How does my baptismal anointing unite me with Christ's mission to bring good news to the world? God desires to make us holy and blameless; do I regularly seek God's grace to grow in holiness, or am I content to stay as I am?

#### 4th Sunday of Advent, December 24

2 Sam 7:1-5, 8-12, 14, 16 Ps 88:2-5, 27, 29 Rom 16:25-27 Lk 1:26-38

Israel's hope for a Messiah can be traced back to God's promise in the Book of Samuel, when the prophet Nathan tells David: "The Lord ... will establish a house for you" (v 11). The line of David "shall stand firm forever" (v 16). Without a king during the intertestamental period, Israel's hopes turned to the future, when God's promise would be renewed in a son of David, one descended from Israel's great king. This is why the Gospel tradition stresses Joseph's place in the line of the house of David: Jesus, as son of David, fulfills the promise.

Paul tells the Romans that in Jesus, "the mystery kept secret for long ages" (v 25) has been revealed. God's promise of a Messiah, originally found in "the prophetic writings" (v 26), is fulfilled in Jesus, so faith in Jesus leads to salvation. Concluding his letter with a doxology, a prayer of praise to God, Paul tells us that because God has fulfilled the promises in Jesus, we should give glory to God.

In these last days of Advent we turn our focus to preparing to commemorate the birth of Jesus. Today's Gospel is the story of the annunciation. God's angel Gabriel is sent to Mary, who we are told is "betrothed to a man named Joseph, / of the house of David" (v 27). The link to the promise made to David is reinforced by the angel's statement that Mary's child will be given "the throne of David his father" (v 32). But this is no ordinary child; conceived by the Holy Spirit, he "will be called holy, the Son of God" (v 35).

For reflection: How does Jesus's connection to David link him more closely to salvation history? What can I do to make my immediate preparation for Christmas take on a more spiritual dimension?
