# The Voice

30th August 2015

Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

Psalter Week 2

I read a terrific book the other day entitled 'Shadows and the Dark'. It is by Australian Jesuit Fr John Cowburn who is Professor of Philosophy at Jesuit Theological College, Melbourne. This book explores how we can hold to a loving God in the face of evil.

The idea for the book came when Fr John fell from his bicycle, broke his collarbone and was awaiting surgery in hospital. While there, an old religious sister came to his room to give him Holy Communion before going to the operating theatre. Fr John told her about the accident. Sister said, 'Well Father, God must have known you needed a little holiday, so he arranged for your fall'. John replied, 'If that's true Sister I'm pleased God didn't want me to take a sabbatical!' From Jesus' day to ours, when bad things happen to good people it seems easier to blame God or Satan. By his own admission Fr John had an accident because he didn't take enough care on his bike. End of story. That God can bring something good out of such an accident is grace building on nature. What Jesus confronts in today's Gospel is 'The-devil-made-me-do-it' theology. And his response is as challenging now as it was in first century Palestine.

For as long as we blame our most destructive behaviour on evil acting upon us in all its guises, empty promises and powers, then we remain some way from taking the sort of responsibility for the condition of our hearts that might see them fully converted by Christ's saving

love. This is not to say that evil does not exist or that it cannot have a powerful effect upon us, quite the opposite. Just as grace builds on love and goodness, evil grows out of estrangement and hatred. As Christians we hold that God has given us free will, and evil's hold on our hearts is often the result of the poor choices and smaller compromises we have made along the way.


The way we look at the evil in our lives and the world also affects our compassion. For if we're not in touch with the greed that leads to theft, the anger that leads to murder, the desire for power that leads to rape, or the alienation that leads to terrorism, then it's hard for us to be compassionate toward the perpetrators of these evil acts. The degree to which we know what our hearts are capable of leads us to be grateful for the graces we receive and cultivate, and to be compassionate toward those who have missed out on this good news and who, by nurture or free will, have chosen evil as their fundamental option.

May this Eucharist enable us to take in the broken body of Christ because we know we are a broken people in need of its power, and as Christ's blood is poured for us, may we be poured out in love, so that, through us, others might hear His call to a conversion of heart.

## The Just Word

### Refugee and Migrant Sunday 30.8.15:

A report of the High Commissioner for refugees recently reported that there is a dangerous wave of mass forced displacement worldwide, which involves almost 60 million people, of whom more than half are children. The phenomenon continues to grow rapidly and is at a level never recorded so far by

UNHCR. The report exposes a sharp increase of people forced to flee their homes, leaving families, cities due to wars, conflicts and persecutions. Of these, more than half are children without any hope of a decent future. At the end of 2014 there was a total of almost 60 million displaced persons, compared to 51 million the previous year. The most sudden increase of refugees oc-

curred in early 2011, when the war broke out in Syria, which caused the highest number of displaced people around the world. In 2014, a daily average of 42,500 people became refugees, asylum seekers or internally displaced persons. (AP).

# Readings for today and next Sunday

## 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time, August 30

Dt 4:1–2, 6–8  
Ps 15:2–3, 3–4, 4–5  
Jas 1:17–18, 21b–22, 27  
Mk 7:1–8, 14–15, 21–23

Moses, shortly before his death, exhorts the people to obey God's commandments, "that you may live" (Dt 4:1). This Deuteronomic Principle is a key theme in much of the Old Testament: good is rewarded and evil is punished. God's commandments are not a burden but a way to life. It is by following God's precepts that Israel will become a light to the nations, a nation whose "statutes and decrees" are just (v 8). As other nations see the righteousness of Israel, they will be drawn to follow God's ways as well, and so Israel serves as a light to the nations.

James speaks of how we are called to be the "first fruits" of God's creatures (v 18). This means that we are the first to share in God's life, but there will be others later. In light of this, like biblical Israel, we are called to be an example to others. James tells us to "put away all filth and evil excess" (v 21a) and, as hearers sharing in God's life, "be doers of the word" (v 22).

"Purity" is not a common word in today's world, but it was a very important concept in Jesus' day. To be "unclean" was to be cut off from others, temporarily or permanently. Over the years Jewish scholars developed a set of regulations, based on the laws in the Torah, spelling out what made an individual unclean. Mark explains some of this to his audience in today's text (vv 3–4). Where Jesus and his opponents, and later the apostolic community and the Jewish authorities, differed was in the interpretation of some of these tra-

ditions. For Jesus, what is in the heart determines whether one is unclean or not. His opponents focused on "human tradition" rather than "God's commandment" (v 8). Our relationship with God is based more on who we are than on what we do.

**For Reflection:** How has following God's way made me a better person? Have I been inspired by the goodness in others to follow God more closely? Am I concerned with developing a heart that is in tune with God?



## 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, September 6

Is 35:4–7  
Ps 146:7, 8–9, 9–10  
Jas 2:1–5  
Mk 7:31–37

In the text of Isaiah, the prophet announces good news "to those whose hearts are frightened: / Be strong, fear not!" (v 4). To a people who have experienced God's judgment, the prophet announces words of renewal and redemption. God comes to save his people. When he comes, he will heal the blind, the deaf, the lame, and the mute. And once again the wilderness will be restored, no longer a "thirsty ground" (v 7). For the church, Jesus is the fulfilment of this promise, as we see in today's Gospel. God calls us to allow him to heal our brokenness.

James cautions against showing partiality to the rich. He reminds us that God chose "those who are poor ... to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom" (v 5). In the Gospels, Jesus frequently associates with those who were rejected by the world because he knows they need to hear God's word. God judges what is in the heart, not what is worn on our backs.

"Every worthwhile gift, every genuine benefit, comes from above," says St. James in the second reading. But, he reminds us, true worship of God involves using those good gifts to benefit the less fortunate. Good stewardship is not optional; it is the hallmark of our faith!

The Decapolis was a region of 10 gentile cities east of the Sea of Galilee. In Mark's text a number of Jesus' miracles are worked in this region, emphasizing that Jesus came not just for the "chosen people" but for all. Mark tells us that a group of people bring a deaf man with a speech impediment to Jesus, begging him to cure the man. Their faith in Jesus' power to heal is obvious. In an unusual detail we hear that Jesus takes the man "away from the crowd" (v 33) before healing him. Using his own saliva, another unusual element, Jesus touches the man's ears and tongue and commands, "Be opened!" and it happens (v 34). A rare feature in today's text is that the Gospel remembers Jesus' ac-

tual word of command in Aramaic, "Ephphatha." Normally we are given his words only in translation.

**For Reflection:** Are my ears open to hear God's word? My lips loose to sing God's praises? Do I judge a book by its cover, or do I try to see as God sees?
