MELVA'S CORNER SUPERVISING YOUR EGO = SPIRITUAL GROWTH



This is advanced material and may require several study sessions to digest.

One of the biggest challenges facing the spiritual evolution of any person is in overcoming the demands of the individual ego. It is simply not possible to achieve enduring and genuine progress until the ego has been well and truly brought under control to the extent that it no longer exerts any negative or detrimental influence upon yourself or anyone else.

The ego is responsible for many negative human traits, including but certainly not limited to being critical and judgmental of others, being rigid and inflexible, being manipulative, need to feel superior, feeling anxious and fearful, mood swings, taking everything too personally, taking everything too seriously, constant need for approval and praise, feeling hurried and driven to do things, competing rather than cooperating, feeling resentful and guilty, unable to live in the present moment, addictions to alcohol. tobacco and other mind altering substances, overly concerned with personal appearance, overly concerned with success, feeling insecure, constant worry over trivialities, clinging to the past, feelings of despair and hopelessness, feeling life is

meaningless, and the need for power over others. All of these are seriously negative human traits and ones that can easily make a person's life a misery.

The ego causes an illusory focus on those aspects of the physical world that are really not at all important for peace, harmony and happiness and most importantly for enduring spiritual growth and progression. Without true inner peace, harmony and living in the Spirit, true progress quite simply cannot be made. It must therefore be considered to be an unwelcome adversary, focusing on the individual self rather than the most sacred path and true meaning of life.

Many people are very quick to blame others or the world in general for their own problems; it is always much easier for people to blame everything and everyone else rather than having to face up to things themselves and taking full responsibility for their own thoughts and actions. Whenever anything adverse happens the immediate reaction of many is usually focused towards looking for scapegoats rather than looking inward toward self for the real cause of the corresponding effect. Some people are so much under the control of their own ego that they really are absolutely convinced they are always right and everyone else and indeed the rest of the world must always be completely wrong; a level of ego which can have most detrimental consequences for those individuals.

The ego constantly strives to have people believe they are not responsible for their own actions but are rather a victim of circumstance or of the state of the world in general. Such a person might blame family, friends, politicians, people they work with, bosses, or simply ascribe negative effects to such non-existent notions as "bad luck", "misfortune" or "chance". In fact absolutely anyone and everyone they can associate with a situation will be blamed rather than

blaming the true cause; themselves.

The ego constantly strives to be always right, always superior, never wrong and never inferior. It constantly seeks selfimportance, power and superiority over others, often at any cost and regardless of who they are affecting or hurting at the same time.

The ego is not something that can simply be destroyed; it is rather a vital aspect of individuality, for life and indeed for conscious awareness. The ultimate objective therefore is not to attempt to destroy it, but rather to transcend its influence; to bringing it under complete control in order to serve its intended purpose. This can be done by accentuating its necessary positive attributes while suppressing the negative and destructive attributes so detrimental to genuine peace, happiness, harmony and personal progress.

The ego can be likened to a telescope on the world collecting sensory information and delivering such information to the five physical senses and the mind. The fact is however, many people do not simply accept the information being received through the ego as a necessary part of conscious existence; they also proceed to analyze or very often even over-analyze the information received through the ego, reacting or over-reacting to it accordingly.

The ego can also be likened to a postal service, delivering letters to the mind for advisorv and informational purposes. These letters should be immediately acknowledged and then filed away for later reference if appropriate. Instead, many will actually open the letters when received and then proceed to tell the ego how to respond to the sensory information. Furthermore, many of us have a tendency to see only those things we want to see and accordingly are selective about which letters we

open and which we will subsequently respond to.

The eqo likes to make comparisons, particularly with other people. In an of itself making comparisons is fine for the purposes of making a necessary choice, the problems really arise when it is not satisfied by merely making comparisons but is allowed to extend the comparisons to include comparative judgments about other people, possessions and everything else the eqo erroneously regards as important. It will for example encourage people to take up various sports, hobbies and skills, often not merely for the benefits of health, happiness or relaxation which they can surely bring, but as a means of seeming superior to others by means of making comparisons relative to their pastimes.

The ego however does need to make comparisons as a function of living in the material world. For example, when walking around a supermarket, comparisons need to be made between the quality and prices of items to be purchased. This sort of comparison is very useful and is being applied for positive reasons. The problems would arise in this case, however, when comparing an item, not for genuine reasons of price or quality, but rather with the purpose of making that purchasing decision based on the perception that the item is superior to an equivalent item already owned by a neighbor, friend or relative.

The same example would hold true in purchasing a new car for example and indeed any highly visible object by which people believe they will personally be judged. In the example of the car, subjective comparisons must, of course, be made between all of the options available in order to take in to account such fundamentals as fuel economy, insurance costs, servicing costs and many other necessary and relevant factors, all of which

need to be reconciled before such a significant purchase can be justified. And that kind of comparison is just fine.

However, by endeavoring to ensure the car is bigger than those of friends, neighbors, relatives and others, has more seats, a bigger engine, better acceleration and top speed, more internal luxuries, better electronic equipment and so on. The ego in this case has clearly caused the purchaser of the car to make a significant purchasing decision over and above that which was fundamentally justifiable, based almost entirely on egotistical reasons; the need for a feeling of perceived superiority over others.

The ego often exerts a particularly strong influence in personal relationships. It is fine to be attracted to a partner for their individual personality and other genuine qualities and virtues, because they share common interests for example and in general because they are very well suited to each other. Some people however will be attracted to a partner for much more superficial reasons, often because they perceive the partner to be glamorous, handsome. appears be generally to attractive in the eyes of others, or very often because they are perceived to be wealthy. In these cases the ego is in full control over something as fundamentally important as choosing a partner, or even a future husband or wife. This of course is a major reason why so many marriages result in separation, divorce or ongoing unhappyness.

The ego has delusions of grandeur and likes nothing more than to be noticed, flattered and admired. In reality of course nothing ever makes anyone better or in any way more superior as compared with anyone else. Every single person without exception is an equal aspect of God, made in the true spiritual image of God; each having unique characteristics, abilities, shortcomings to face and so on. If we judge others then we equally judge ourselves. Acceptance is an important aspect of life, acceptance of everyone for who they really are, what they represent and most importantly as an equal expression of God.

The other side of the ego is in feeling worse or inferior by comparison with others. People might perceive themselves for example to feel useless, unworthy, unwanted and many other such negative perceptions of self. There really is no difference at all between this side of the ego and the one suffering from delusions of grandeur; they are all negative aspects and degrees of the same thing. Ultimately to transcend the ego is to know beyond any doubts whatsoever that everyone without exception is equal and to live and interact with people and situations accordingly. God is perfection and everyone without exception is an inseparable expression and equal aspect of that same perfection.

The ego will revel in exerting its influence over many other aspects of people's lives. For example, there are those who like to feel sorry for themselves by feeling they are a victim or a martyr in some way. Such people will often feel everything is hopeless, that they are burdened with demands and responsibilities they cannot handle, feel unappreciated, misunderstood, feel badly treated and generally believing they are the victim of bad luck, chance, misfortune and other such non-existent notions.

The ego does not like responsibility and will often do whatever it can to deny and avoid it. A typical sign the ego is in control of responsibility is when people blame others for everything that goes wrong in their own lives. The ego will typically blame anyone and everyone except themselves for what happens to them, they do not like or will not accept responsibility; blaming the government, a friend, a neighbor, a family member, a co-worker or even God. As we already know, each and every person creates their own reality and thus to blame others is quite simply futile.

This is not to say however people are knowingly creating situations giving rise to the response of the ego, but are rather doing so subconsciously. It is not until all negative situations are accepted and fully analyzed can the realization be reached as to its origins and thereby positive actions be taken to make the necessary corrections.

Accepting full responsibility for all such situations is empowering and those who can achieve this will have considerably more control over every aspect of their own lives, will be in conscious control of creating their own reality and as a direct result experience a much happier, more peaceful and harmonious life.

The ego also revels in the illusion of always being busy. People often like to believe they are so busy with daily work, chores and other responsibilities that they have no time available for anything or anyone else, often including themselves. The more a person dwells on this illusion of busyness, the busier they will believe they really are: a situation that can quickly escalate into a full busyness martyr syndrome. Worse still, if the ego believes a person is not busy enough it will create work in order to justify the illusion of busyness, often repeating the same chores and tasks over and over again until they are perceived to be satisfactory and the need for feeling busy has accordingly satisfied the ego. Such people always consider themselves to be very busy, always endeavoring to make the people around them believe they really are busy and yet still getting nowhere in particular and not achieving much of any real significance, certainly not in proportion to their perceived workload.

The ego also often revels in disaster, particularly when it happens to people who are not liked. People unfortunately often revel in the misfortunes of others on whatever scale the misfortune occurs. whether it is a problem at work, someone losing their employment, a marriage breaking up or simply a general lack of ability by someone to accomplish something. Unfortunately, people generally find it much easier to revel in the misfortune of others than to equally share in their happiness when good and positive things happen to the same people. This is again another extremely negative and insidious attribute of the ego, believing itself to be always superior and reveling in the misfortune of others in order to satisfy itself and to create an illusion of perceived superiority over others.

Notwithstanding all of its insidious influences, the ego is nevertheless a vital aspect of conscious awareness. At the same time the ego is frequently responsible for considerable misery and suffering and a lack of peace and harmony generally. It strives to dominate and feel superior and always insists on getting its own way if at all possible.

The ego can and will hold people back both in everyday life and in personal evolution and progression on the path to spiritual growth. Until such time as the ego is tamed and its influence fully transcended, true and enduring progress, peace, happiness and harmony quite simply cannot be achieved and maintained.

Soon I will make available a practical exercise that if used daily can transcend the ego. Stay tuned. Much, much more to come. \Box

WHY ARE YOUNG PEOPLE LEAVING THE CHURCH?

Christian young people today are leaving our churches in droves because they find church to be irrelevant at best. often contentious with non-Christians in the main and totally lacking in concern for bigger issues of social justice, poverty, hunger, and modern slavery — estimates are that there are well over 25 million people enslaved in the world today, most of them children in horrible situations being forced to do despicable and often barbaric things. As churches squabble over internal differences, divide over denominational lovalties and find themselves absorbed in the cult of media personalities, young people continue to leave in droves. They see few great works being done with commitment and passion that reflect the ministry and sacrifices of Christ.

I am absolutely convinced that this is partially the result of an impotent and non-biblical grace that has been widely taught. This kind of grace as Dietrich Bonhoeffer called it decades ago is false grace. It calls people to quick and easy formula type of conversion that requires no repentance or no discipleship.

Remember how the apostle Paul described grace:

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them (Ephesians 2:8-10 NKJV). This great passage doesn't end on the truth that we can't earn our salvation. Instead, it goes on to remind us that grace is God's way of working His artistry in us — we are His "workmanship." God's grace makes us new so that we can do something significant by His power to display His glorious grace to others. Put bluntly, grace is not just about saving us FROM the wrath of God, but it is also about saving us FOR God's purposes in the world.

The emerging generation of young adults is looking for us to do more than come together in insular buildings and talk about moral conduct and celebrate that we've been saved from what is bad. They are looking for us to hear God's grace call us to a new lifestyle of making real differences in the world around us. This high and holy calling is what we've been remade by grace to do — God planned in advance as our role in this world. So let's be more than reminded; let's be changed. Let's recognize that God has great things for us to do by His powerful grace so that the world can see the church as Jesus in action in today's world.

He became known as "The Lion of the Senate", through his long tenure and influence. More than 300 bills that Senator Kennedy and his staff wrote were enacted into law. He was known for working with Republicans and finding compromises among Senators with disparate views.

Senator Kennedy played a major role in passing many laws that affect the lives of all Americans, including the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965, the National Cancer Act of 1971, the Comprehensive Anti-Apartheid Act of 1986, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, the Ryan White AIDS Care Act in 1990, the Civil Rights Act of 1991. In 1996, Senator Kennedy secured an increase in the minimum wage law, a favorite issue of his: there would not be another increase for ten years. Following the failure of the Clinton health care plan, he went against his past strategy and sought incremental measures instead. Senator Kennedy worked with Republican Senator Nancy Kassebaum to create and pass the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act in 1996, which set new marks for portability of insurance and confidentiality of records. The same year, his Mental Health Parity Act forced insurance companies to treat mental health payments the same as others with respect to limits reached. In 1997, Senator Kennedy was the prime mover behind the State Children's Health Insurance Program, which used increased tobacco taxes to fund the largest expansion of taxpayerfunded health insurance coverage for children in the U.S. since Medicaid began in the 1960s.

- Health Care Debate Hits Faith Community. The White House launched the "40 Days for Health Reform" initiative in August. The ads include a collection of clergy who support health care reform such as Rev. Stevie Wakes, Pastor of Olivet Institutional Baptist Church in Kansas City.

Many American families are still struggling in the current economic environment so let's continue our prayers in this area.

The request included records relating to compensation of executive employees, documents relating to companies' premium income and

claims payments, and information on expenses stemming from any event held outside company facilities in the past two and a half years.

ARE YOU A DEMOCRAT OR REPUBLICAN?



My title may be misleading. This article isn't all about politics – although it is. It is about everything. It is about business, education, choosing (or rejecting) motherhood and eating apple pie. It is about mowing grass, taking exams, balancing a checkbook and changing oil. And, yes, it is about politics.

I confess to being bothered by things I hear relative to "who a Christian should vote for." Some vote Democratic, others vote Republican and some write in a vote for somebody whose name most of us have never heard of. Faith doesn't dictate a particular social order and spiritual people are not all members of the same political party.

Part of the genius of faith is that it isn't American or French. It doesn't make you antidemocracy or anti-monarchy. And it doesn't require you to favor socialism or capitalism. In the case of Christian faith, it declares that one's true citizenship is in God's kingdom and that his or her life under whatever political system is to be lived for the sake of a divine calling.

On the one hand, faith is not divorced from one's social context. It should make one a better citizen in Africa, Europe, or America. A God-honoring way of life moves us to care for our neighbors and to seek the good of all people. On the other hand, faith is not defined by one's social context. A man or woman can be a true and faithful child of God in Russia, Australia, or North Korea. Nothing about earthly governments trumps the value of a heavenly or spiritual citizenship.

For several hundred years, Christians have struggled to come to terms with how verses in the Bible tell us that we're saved by faith and not by works reconcile with verses that tell us that we're saved by what we do and not faith alone. There are texts, after all, that say both of those things. And it's fair to ask how both can be true, and it's understandable that we might think one contradicted the other. But like a lot of deep theological mysteries, this one dissipates with an application of common sense and a dose of experience. You know there are people, whether you know any of them personally or not, whose faith is a facade. There's an exterior that might fool someone at first glance. Maybe it's a carefullymaintained exterior, even, that can withstand more than a cursory glance. They're known for their piety. Respected and admired in their churches. Maybe they're leaders in their churches, even: people who others follow and emulate. They say things that give the impression of a deep relationship with God. They know the Bible. They're fluent in "churchy" vocabulary. But get to know them, and you see that their faith doesn't go five feet deep. You find that there's nothing behind the facade.

You also know people, and I bet you know some personally, whose faith is genuine. Oh, you can see it from the outside too, just like the "facade" Christians. But in their case, there's something behind the exterior. Their faith isn't strictly to be seen from the outside. You're welcome to open the windows, walk through the doors, and see what's behind it all. Maybe their piety is known and respected as well, maybe they're fluent in "churchy" vocabulary as well, but their faith is about more than those things. It's a faith that shows itself in their office as well as in their church. It's a faith that's comfortable serving the poor as well as saying important things in a Bible class. They might know the Bible and they certainly know it well enough to know that "facade" faith isn't really faith at all. They know — and they model — that real faith is practical.

Because that's really the difference, isn't it? That's how we know whether our faith is genuine or not. "What good is it . . . if people claim to have faith but have no deeds? Can such faith save them?" That may sound a little harsh, a little intolerant, but I think James just means to point out something that deep down we all know. Real faith, real trust in God, always creates action. In response to God's love and grace, people act.

Look at the stories in the Bible of the people who trusted God and you see that it's true. Abraham, Moses, David, Jeremiah. Daniel, Esther, Nehemiah. Rahab, Joshua, Noah. These were people of action, because they had faith that as long as they trusted God the things they did were not in vain.

You can also look at a lot of those folks and see that they didn't always make the right choices. God doesn't ask us for flawless judgment and He recognizes that none of us are immune to temptation and He knows our limits. All He asks is that we trust Him — have faith in Him — and He promises that He'll watch over us and protect us and redeem us.

But real faith is always — always — practical.

I think it's great that the Bible doesn't ask us to judge each others' faith. That's because the only faith I'm truly able to evaluate is my own. And the best way I know to do that is to ask myself one question: "Is my faith practical?" Is there anything behind the facade? Will my faith contain the work God wants me to do? Does it tell the story of His grace in my life? Does it bring about action? Or is it just for show — a false front I wear to play a part for those who might be looking on?

If honest evaluation tells me that there's not much action in my faith, then it's time to make a change. It's time to serve. To work. To act in God's name. It's time to put some depth in my faith, add some practical to my facade. To rest secure in God's love — not because of the things I've done, but through genuine trust in His grace.

So what's with the title? Why raise the issue of "faith and politics" or "faith and business" or "faith and family"? Simply to make the point that good theology and authentic faith are always practical. They relate to life as it is being lived every day by 'so called' ordinary men and women in our homes and workplaces.

Eugene Peterson says that a healthy pursuit of the spiritual life is "the development of awareness and discernments that are as alert and responsible in the workplace as in the sanctuary, as active while changing diapers in a nursery as while meditating in a grove of oranges, as necessary when reading a newspaper editorial as when exegeting a sentence written in Hebrew."

Faith is the orientation of a life that is expressing God. Scripture is a compass to keep us from getting disoriented on our journey. Jesus is the defining personal example of what it is to live spiritually. If you believe all three of those statements – as I do – there is nothing about any one of them or all taken together that dictates your party preference, the career you must pursue, or the city where you must live. Yet all those decisions will be guided by your faith.

Faith is not your private opinion but the life-defining commitment by which everything in your public and relational life is decided. Once you define your life as one that expresses Godly Principles, your party preference will be illuminated. So, in essence, your party preference does not define your faith; your faith defines your party preference.

ATTITUDE IS EVERYTHING

There is a section in John Baillie's A Diary of Private Prayer that reads ...

Teach me, O God, so to use all the circumstances of my life today that they may bring forth in me the fruits of holiness rather than the fruits of sin. Let me use disappointment as material for patience; Let me use success as material for thankfulness; Let me use suspense as material for perseverance; Let me use danger as material for courage; Let me use reproach as material for longsuffering; Let me use praise as material for humility; Let me use pleasures as material for temperance; Let me use pleasures as material for endurance.

When a given day begins, countless things are headed your way over which you have no control. It may be bad weather or someone's bad temper, a deadline that won't budge or a client equally resistant to change. The one factor you *can* control through it all is your attitude toward them.

Your attitude today will make all the difference in everything that matters.
