A New Fleet Captain Tapped

As most of you know, Rich Alt has been the Fleet Captain and Youth Sail Director for the past several years. With Rich's new obligations as an elected official for the City of Southport, he had informed the BoG earlier this year that this would be his last year in this capacity. After much thought and conversation, I am happy to announce that John Bates, a long-time CFYC member, who is newly retired, has agreed to take over the reins. He and Rich will work the rest of this year transitioning and reviewing the future needs and direction of our Youth Sail Program and our assessing the needs of our fleet. 
John holds his Captain's license and was instrumental in bringing us the instructor and classes for the Captain's License and 1st Mate earlier this year. John and his wife, Lori, own a sailboat slipped at Safe Harbor Marina and John loves to race. With the worst of Covid behind us, he is hoping to resurrect our sailboat racing events.

Where Are They Now...

Beginning as a YS Summer Camper...he continues his journey... A focus on Joe Harazim

Joe entered the YS Program as a student at age 11, and then came back the following year. During the second year as a student, towards the end of the week, Kim Sniffin offered Joe a paid internship starting the final week of that season. \$100 dollars for a week of work was a lot for 12-year-old Joe. He worked mostly behind the scenes while being taught boating skills, which was a blast for someone who couldn't drive a car yet. Joe worked as an assistant instructor from the age of 13 to 16, then head instructor from age 17-23 (2009-2019 total)

Joe attended UNC Charlotte for a Bachelors in Mechanical Engineering Technology, and was commissioned as 2nd Lt in USAF with a pilot slot through ROTC. Joe completed his Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) in March 2022, Roughly 200 flight hours between the T-6 Texan II and the T-38C Talon. Just before UPT graduation, he received his next aircraft assignment, the F-16. This training will be in Luke AFB, AZ, starting in September 2022 (Known as "B course"). Joe's last hurdle before beginning the F-16 B course is Introduction to Fighter Fundamentals (IFF) at the 49th Flying Training Squadron, which he began in May and will finish at the end of the July. UPT teaches you how to fly, while IFF teaches you the basics of how to fight while you fly. Very fun and tough flying, you're max performing the 60 year old T-38 in simulated dogfights against skilled instructor pilots, all of which have prior experience flying fighters before coming back to instruct.



Joe, Any funny stories in sailing you wish to share?

"The program got really fun and more open to returning, older/bigger students when we got the fleet of 420s. Students moving from a small, slow, single crew Opti to a larger, faster, more challenging 420 with another crewmember was very rewarding. Once the students learned the basics in the basin, the 420s allowed us to sail much further and really push the students and instructors. We routinely had the students sail to Southport, across the Cape Fear to Bird Island, and even to the new Oak Island Bridge a couple of times. I remember on the higher wind days we'd be out in front of Southport or crossing the Cape Fear River and there'd be that crew of 2 smaller students absolutely ripping along, 50 degrees of heel, completely hiked out, confident as hell as there were other power boats, barges, and ferries coming through. The kids would have huge grins, and I'd have a huge grin while hollering that they're killing it. Stuff like that still makes me smile. That and slow, completely avoidable capsizes in both the 420 and Opti; where the student had several seconds to react, but instead yelled and froze as they slowly went from right side up to upside down-ish. Looking back I can't believe we managed to teach students, sometimes as young as 8 or 9, to sail a 420 proficiently. I remember that boat could kick my butt physically and mentally as a 21year old, and there's someone who weighs less than half my weight and is half my age pulling it off.

Sailing and flying aren't that different. They can both make you sick, they're both very complex, and you need high amounts of situational awareness, practice, and skill to pull it off safely. Instructing was very high stress at times. Keeping tabs on up to 10 boats at a time, sometimes miles from where you launched, sometimes with multiple capsizes or issues to deal with at once, got a little crazy. Dealing with that kind of stress and responsibility at a younger age definitely helped me perform in pilot training, and still helps me to this day."

Joe and his wife Kylie are members of the CFYC and expect to return this weekend to race in the Ed Harper Memorial Regatta. They were married at the CFYC Clubhouse in March of 2021.
