STEWARDSHIP AT BLESSED SACRAMENT Becoming Eucharistic People

At the last supper, Jesus gave us His Body and Blood, telling us, "Love one another as I have loved you." Then just a few hours later, He made the ultimate sacrifice of love on the cross. The invitation is clear: if Jesus laid down His life for us, we are called to give our lives to others. At Blessed Sacrament, we call this lifestyle stewardship.

This year, during our annual Stewardship Renewal, we have an opportunity to reflect deeply on the source and summit of the life and mission of the Church. We at Blessed Sacrament are truly striving to become a Eucharistic People, which is reflected in our stewardship theme: *Take, Bless, Break, Give.* As Christ gave Himself to us, so we give ourselves to others.

All families are asked to use their Commitment Card to make commitments of time, talent, and treasure, then bring the completed card to Mass on **August 26/27**.

Worshipping Christ in the Eucharist

As Catholics, the Eucharist is the center of our prayer lives. While we are all called to pray daily — on the way to work, with our family, before bedtime — the heart of our spirituality is celebrating the Eucharist, during which we receive Jesus in Communion. This year we are placing special emphasis on attending Mass each Sunday, which is not only an obligation, but also a great privilege. On your Commitment Card are listed several other ways to put Jesus at the center of our lives through regular prayer.

Stewardship of Treasure

Putting God First in Finances

When Jesus observed a poor widow giving a small contribution to the temple, He remarked to His apostles, "This poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others." In this touching scene, we learn that our gifts should be proportionate: if your income is low, your gift will be small; for those who have more, more is expected. Moreover, we learn from this parable that Christ honors our sacrifice; He cherishes the sacrifice we make when we give from our substance rather than from our surplus.

While the Church doesn't have any hard-and-fast rules for financial support, in Scripture we find that the Israelites were asked to give God 10 percent of their harvest. Thus, the tithe has become a standard for most Christian communities, including Blessed Sacrament. We ask that each family apportion their tithe as follows:

> 5% to Blessed Sacrament 1% to the diocese 4% to other charities

Action steps to for financial generosity:

- Strive to give 5% to Blessed Sacrament
- Commit to a specific gift each week or month
- Use your offertory envelopes or direct deposit

Children's Liturgy of the Word

Volunteers, including older youth through grandparents, lead children ages 3 through sixth grade in a Liturgy of the Word for Children at the 10 a.m. Mass twice a month. This includes 30 minutes of age-appropriate study, prayer, and crafts based on the Sunday readings.

Preschool through Grade 8 Religious Education Classes are offered on Wednesday evenings from September through Easter. This includes sacramental preparation for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist. Volunteers who have a desire to pass on the faith to our youth are needed. Training and support are offered.



High School Religious Education We use the Godparent Program Model for our high school religious formation program. This model includes theological discussion, practical applications, social activities, and prayer. Godparent couples or teams need to be able to relate to teen issues. Godparents stay with their group two and a half years, from freshman year until preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation, which begins during the junior year.

Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA formerly RCIA) This is a faith formation process that includes doctrinal understandings and growth in relationship with Christ and the Church. It is for those who wish to become Catholic and for Catholics who wish to understand their faith better. A team of volunteers leads the process from September until just after Easter.

Adult Enrichment Short programs for adults are led by volunteers, clergy, and persons in consecrated life, to deepen the theological and scriptural understandings and faith life. BeFriender Ministries This ministry extends the pastoral care the parish can provide to those who need it or could use an added connection to the Church because they are homebound or in a care center. Additional responsibilities include taking up the collection, distributing bulletins and picking up the church after Mass. Four people are needed for each Mass and children are welcome to serve with their family. Altar Servers Assist the priest at Mass. Servers range in age from fourth grade through adult. Parents may serve with their children.

Music Ministers Accompanists, cantors, choir members, and soloists enhance the Liturgy with their music and by leading the congregation in raising their voices in sung praise of God.
